# ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## Sydney University Cricket Club.

*For the Season 1914-5.*

GENTLEMEN,—

Your Committee has pleasure in presenting to you the fiftieth Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the year ending April, 1915.

The results achieved for the season cannot, on the whole, be classed as excellent, though many circumstances have combined to militate against pronounced success. The outbreak of the war meant to us the loss during the season of several of our veteran performers, and occasional compulsory Saturday parades have played havoc with the personnel of the teams. Still, in spite of all this, excellent individual performances have been registered and great keenness has been exhibited.

The First XI. qualified for the final rounds among the first four Clubs, but with weakened teams dropped back to sixth place. Four men alone from the first match of the season remained to take part in the last. The Second XI. too, has suffered much and its low position on the list is due to similar causes. The Third XI. performed creditably, but, owing to the incessant demands of the higher Elevens, did not occupy the position it would have undoubtedly done otherwise.

The 34th Inter-Varsity match was played in Sydney, and won by the home team after an excellent recovery by the visitors in their second innings. The concluding day of the match was marred by the sudden death of the visiting captain's father. Mr. R. L. Park has conveyed to the Secretary his heartfelt gratitude for the sympathy shown to him by the Club and the players in his sad bereavement. Your Club was represented by W. J. Stack (captain), E. P. Barbour, N. M. Gregg, F. M. Farrar, J. C. Lamrock, C. R.

Campling, L. Best, R. Bardsley, E. J. McCaffrey, B. B. Barrack, and W. F. Crawford.

The records of the teams were as follows:—

First XI.—Won outright 1, won 5, lost 4, drawn 2, points 19/36, percentage 52.77, sixth place.

Second XI.—Won 5, lost 6, drawn 1, points 15½/36.

Third XI.—Matches played 12, won outright 3, won first innings 2, lost outright 3, lost first innings 3, drawn 1, points 17½/36, percentage 48.61.

At the instigation of Queensland University, arrangements were made with a view to commencing an Annual Inter-Varsity Match. When almost at fruition all arrangements for the visitors' trip to Sydney had with great reluctance to be cancelled. We feel sure, however, that though success did not attend these, our first efforts, yet that the way has been paved for future contests with our sister University in the North.

The most noticeable features in the First XI. averages are the consistent batting performances of E. P. Barbour, which gave a solid stiffening to the team, and on one particular occasion, viz., 88 out of a total of 140, against Central Cumberland, pulled the match out of the fire, and the excellent bowling of R. B. Minnett, and, in the later matches, of N. M. Gregg. Six centuries were scored for the Club in Competition matches, Barbour registering two, Farrar two, Gregg and Best one each; while Best also topped the hundred against Melbourne University. The wickets during the season were divided between Minnett (33), Gregg (29), Stack (20), Barbour (19), and Best (13). With a feeling of modest pride, we record the fact that earlier in the season, when the team was at its full strength, a most meritorious victory was secured at the expense of the subsequent Premiers, Western Suburbs.

Once again the Club was to the fore in representative cricket. Minnett, Barbour, Gregg, Farrar, and Best were all selected to represent the State, while the bowling of Minnett was extremely successful. Gregg, Farrar, and Best were selected to play against the Victorian Colts, and did themselves credit. The performance for the season of L. Best, is worthy of special notice. Starting as a Fresher in the team, he worked himself up by consistent bowling and batting until he was selected first for the Colts and then for the State team. R. Bardsley, also a Fresher, performed

very creditably with the bat, as also did C. R. Campling with the ball in the later stages of the season.

The services of W. J. Stack were definitely lost to University cricket during the current season. On obtaining his degree, Dr. Stack enlisted for service, and left the cricket arena for the Liverpool Camp. Probably no bowler has taken more wickets for the Club than Stack, and the Club has lost one of its best, keenest, and most popular captains.

Later in the season other severe losses from our ranks were sustained. R. B. Minnett, N. M. Gregg, and E. P. Barbour all graduated in Medicine, and left to pursue their life work, the former two volunteering for service.

In four such sterling and seasoned players the Club has lost members prominent not only in the field, but also in the Executive work of the Committee.

The Second XI. has had an in-and-out season, due chiefly to the aforementioned causes. Good individual performances have been registered with the bat by A. R. Muir, C. D. Holliday, and H. G. Leahy, and with the ball by C. R. Campling, A. R. Blacket, and N. Fox. The only centuries recorded during the season have both been obtained by A. R. Muir.

The Third XI. had a fairly successful season, finishing up with a percentage of 48. For the first time in recent years, no matches were forfeited during the long vacation, and the only forfeit to be recorded was the last match of the season, and that owing to a compulsory parade. In batting, N. O. Barton, H. V. Evatt, and W. Bee secured the best averages, and H. V. Evatt the aggregate. The bowling of the side was good, J. H. Pelly, who secured most wickets, J. A. Schofield, and R. M. Sturt performing with most success. The fielding was only fair, and the team suffered owing to many vacancies occurring in the first two Elevens. However, the performances of the Thirds were considerably better than for some years, and the senior teams should benefit from this during future seasons.

The Wednesday XI. had a very successful season, many enjoyable matches being played against the Great Public Schools and other teams. Towards the end a few matches unfortunately had to be abandoned on account of wet weather. Seven matches in all were played, of which four were won, two lost, and one drawn. N. Fox was the only

one to top the century, which he did in good style against S.C.E.G.S. A match against the Freshmen at the beginning of the season was keenly contested, and brought to light some promising material.

An invitation for the "A" Team to visit Goulburn had to be reluctantly declined.

The Veterans again had a highly successful season, and were defeated but twice. The trip to Duntroon to play against the Royal Military College had to be abandoned, and some few of the later matches also had to suffer the same fate. The annual matches arranged with the Great Public Schools were again played, and these matches are always filled with interest.

Unfortunately no details of batting and bowling averages can be given this year. However, the success of the team largely depended upon the batting of A. B. S. White, F. C. Rogers, and H. H. I. Massie, the bowling of A. I. Blue and H. Marks, and the wicket-keeping of T. Gibson.

Your Committee would place on record its appreciation of the services of Mr. J. Biggs, who once again scored for the Club throughout the season.

Your Club was fortunate in retaining for the year as its office-bearers the President and many of the Vice-Presidents for 1913, who have always shown such enthusiasm and interest in all University cricket. We should like to place on record our appreciation of the President's generous donation of a trophy for the top-scorer in the inter-Varsity match. This trophy was won by L. Best, with a score of 138.

It is hoped that, despite the loss of so many prominent players, the younger members of the Club, who promise so well, will set themselves resolutely to work to win back for the Club the premiership lost by us to Western Suburbs this year.

# ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## Sydney University Cricket Club.

*For the Season 1914-5.*

GENTLEMEN,—

Your Committee has pleasure in presenting to you the fiftieth Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the year ending April, 1915.

The results achieved for the season cannot, on the whole, be classed as excellent, though many circumstances have combined to militate against pronounced success. The outbreak of the war meant to us the loss during the season of several of our veteran performers, and occasional compulsory Saturday parades have played havoc with the personnel of the teams. Still, in spite of all this, excellent individual performances have been registered and great keenness has been exhibited.

The First XI. qualified for the final rounds among the first four Clubs, but with weakened teams dropped back to sixth place. Four men alone from the first match of the season remained to take part in the last. The Second XI., too, has suffered much, and its low position on the list is due to similar causes. The Third XI. performed creditably, but, owing to the incessant demands of the higher Elevens, did not occupy the position it would have undoubtedly done otherwise.

The 34th Inter-'Varsity match was played in Sydney, and won by the home team after an excellent recovery by the visitors in their second innings. The concluding day of the match was marred by the sudden death of the visiting captain's father. Mr. R. L. Park has conveyed to the Secretary his heartfelt gratitude for the sympathy shown to him by the Club and the players in his sad bereavement. Your Club was represented by W. J. Stack (captain), E. P. Barbour, N. M. Gregg, F. M. Farrar, J. C. Lamrock, C. R.

Campling, L. Best, R. Bardsley, E. J. McCaffrey, B. B. Barrack, and W. F. Crawford.

The records of the teams were as follows:—

First XI.—Won outright 1, won 5, lost 4, drawn 2, points 19/36, percentage 52.77, sixth place.

Second XI.—Won 5, lost 6, drawn 1, points 15½/36.

Third XI.—Matches played 12, won outright 3, won first innings 2, lost outright 3, lost first innings 3, drawn 1, points 17½/36, percentage 48.61.

At the instigation of Queensland University, arrangements were made with a view to commencing an Annual Inter-'Varsity Match. When almost at fruition all arrangements for the visitors' trip to Sydney had with great reluctance to be cancelled. We feel sure, however, that though success did not attend these, our first efforts, yet that the way has been paved for future contests with our sister University in the North.

The most noticeable features in the First XI. averages are the consistent batting performances of E. P. Barbour, which gave a solid stiffening to the team, and on one particular occasion, viz., 88 out of a total of 140, against Central Cumberland, pulled the match out of the fire, and the excellent bowling of R. B. Minnett, and, in the later matches, of N. M. Gregg. Six centuries were scored for the Club in Competition matches, Barbour registering two, Farrar two, Gregg and Best one each; while Best also topped the hundred against Melbourne University. The wickets during the season were divided between Minnett (33), Gregg (29), Stack (20), Barbour (19), and Best (18). With a feeling of modest pride, we record the fact that earlier in the season, when the team was at its full strength, a most meritorious victory was secured at the expense of the subsequent Premiers, Western Suburbs.

Once again the Club was to the fore in representative cricket. Minnett, Barbour, Gregg, Farrar, and Best were all selected to represent the State, while the bowling of Minnett was extremely successful. Gregg, Farrar, and Best were selected to play against the Victorian Colts, and did themselves credit. The performance for the season of L. Best, is worthy of special notice. Starting as a Fresher in the team, he worked himself up by consistent bowling and batting until he was selected first for the Colts and then for the State team. R. Bardsley, also a Fresher, performed



very creditably with the bat, as also did C. R. Campling with the ball in the later stages of the season.

The services of W. J. Stack were definitely lost to University cricket during the current season. On obtaining his degree, Dr. Stack enlisted for service, and left the cricket arena for the Liverpool Camp. Probably no bowler has taken more wickets for the Club than Stack, and the Club has lost one of its best, keenest, and most popular captains.

Later in the season other severe losses from our ranks were sustained. R. B. Minnett, N. M. Gregg, and E. P. Barbour all graduated in Medicine, and left to pursue their life work, the former two volunteering for service.

In four such sterling and seasoned players the Club has lost members prominent not only in the field, but also in the Executive work of the Committee.

The Second XI. has had an in-and-out season, due chiefly to the aforementioned causes. Good individual performances have been registered with the bat by A. R. Muir, C. D. Holliday, and H. G. Leahy, and with the ball by C. R. Campling, A. R. Blacket, and N. Fox. The only centuries recorded during the season have both been obtained by A. R. Muir.

The Third XI. had a fairly successful season, finishing up with a percentage of 48. For the first time in recent years, no matches were forfeited during the long vacation, and the only forfeit to be recorded was the last match of the season, and that owing to a compulsory parade. In batting, N. O. Barton, H. V. Evatt, and W. Bee secured the best averages, and H. V. Evatt the aggregate. The bowling of the side was good, J. H. Pelly, who secured most wickets, J. A. Schofield, and R. M. Sturt performing with most success. The fielding was only fair, and the team suffered owing to many vacancies occurring in the first two Elevens. However, the performances of the Thirds were considerably better than for some years, and the senior teams should benefit from this during future seasons.

The Wednesday XI. had a very successful season, many enjoyable matches being played against the Great Public Schools and other teams. Towards the end a few matches unfortunately had to be abandoned on account of wet weather. Seven matches in all were played, of which four were won, two lost, and one drawn. N. Fox was the only

one to top the century, which he did in good style against S.C.E.G.S. A match against the Freshmen at the beginning of the season was keenly contested, and brought to light some promising material.

An invitation for the "A" Team to visit Goulburn had to be reluctantly declined.

The Veterans again had a highly successful season, and were defeated but twice. The trip to Duntroon to play against the Royal Military College had to be abandoned, and some few of the later matches also had to suffer the same fate. The annual matches arranged with the Great Public Schools were again played, and these matches are always filled with interest.

Unfortunately no details of batting and bowling averages can be given this year. However, the success of the team largely depended upon the batting of A. B. S. White, F. C. Rogers, and H. H. I. Massie, the bowling of A. I. Blue and H. Marks, and the wicket-keeping of T. Gibson.

Your Committee would place on record its appreciation of the services of Mr. J. Biggs, who once again scored for the Club throughout the season.

Your Club was fortunate in retaining for the year as its office-bearers the President and many of the Vice-Presidents for 1913, who have always shown such enthusiasm and interest in all University cricket. We should like to place on record our appreciation of the President's generous donation of a trophy for the top-scorer in the inter-'Varsity match. This trophy was won by L. Best, with a score of 138.

It is hoped that, despite the loss of so many prominent players, the younger members of the Club, who promise so well, will set themselves resolutely to work to win back for the Club the premiership lost by us to Western Suburbs this year.

The past season has been a most busy and most successful one. The outstanding success of the year was the winning of the final of the Combined Australian Universities' Cricket Championship. Four Universities competed. Brisbane forfeited to Sydney, and Adelaide defeated Melbourne. The final between Adelaide and Sydney was played in Melbourne, and resulted in a win for Sydney by three wickets after an interesting and keenly-fought match. The match was unique in that it was the first of its kind. Previously, Sydney and Melbourne alone took part in inter-University cricket: this was the first time that four Universities had competed and the series finalised. The matches were arranged by the Australian Universities' Sports Council.

The teams have met with considerable success during the season in grade matches. The 1st XI. was strong, and from the start occupied a position near the top of the competition. This position was retained throughout the season, and the team finished fifth, with the following fine record:—

Of the batsmen, H. Rock and R. Bardsley deserve special mention.

H. Rock batted consistently throughout the season, and gave many splendid displays. His biggest innings was gained against Marrickville, when he scored 117. He came fifth in the grade averages and fourth in the aggregate.

R. Bardsley batted consistently, and always got runs when needed. His best innings was 99 against North Sydney.

Of the bowlers, J. Garner was most successful. His bowling was always accurate, and was very difficult on wet wickets. His best performance was 5 for 14 against Paddington. A. Kendall also bowled well, and he deserved more success, as he was not well supported in the field.

The fielding of the team was far from satisfactory, this being by far the weakest part of the team's play.

R. Boyce captained N.S.W. against Queensland, and also in the Sheffield Shield match against South Australia. R. Bardsley played twice for N.S.W. 2nd XI. against Victoria, captaining the team on one occasion. H. Rock was 12th man against South Australia.

The 1st XI. was captained by R. Bardsley, and the success of the XI. is largely due to the skilful way he managed the team.

The 2nd XI. was again captained by J. Schofield, to whom great credit is due for his strenuous effort for the team. T. Flattery also worked hard, and gave the captain valuable assistance. The team started the season well, and for a time were top of the competition. However, the long vacation upset them, and though they did well and finished sixth, the expectations of earlier in the season were not fulfilled.

The 3rd XI. gave great promise at the beginning of the season: but during the long vacation, it was impossible to get men, and three matches were forfeited. For other matches, teams were raised with great difficulty, and were often two or three men short, as a result, they finished last but two. J. Mould was an energetic worker, and it was largely due to his efforts that teams were obtained at all.

The attendance at practice at Oval after first few weeks was very poor. This should be remedied, as team works together better if they practice together, and fielding practice can be indulged in.

The following were recommended for Blues:—R. Bardsley, E. Rofe, A. C. Yates, R. M. Sturt, C. H. Lawes, J. V. Garner, A. E. Kendall, M. B. Hesslein, J. E. Pratten, J. Sullivan, J. Jagelman.

Thanks are due to Mr. Chislett for the excellent condition of practice and centre wickets and surface of Oval generally.

The College matches were keenly contested. St. Andrew's defeated St. Paul's in the final.

An inter-faculty competition was inaugurated this year, and proved a great success. It took the form of a knock-out competition, and matches were limited to one afternoon. The final was played between Arts and Science, and Med. IV. and V., and resulted in a win for Arts and Science. Competition was very popular, and provided an excellent opportunity for men who could not get games with grade teams.

A 4th XI. was sent one Saturday to H.A. College. It suffered defeat, but an enjoyable afternoon was spent.

The annual match between combined G.P.S. and University 1st and 2nd XI's. were played, and both resulted in wins for University.

The Wednesday XI. played a number of games, mostly against the Great Public Schools, and were very popular.

The College, with two wickets in hand, required 28 runs to win. Socially, the trip was an unqualified success.

It was not found possible to arrange a match between the Vets.' team and the University first eleven. The Vets. think that they could have given the 'Varsity team a good game. It is hoped that this fixture can be arranged next season.

Your Committee has much pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for season 1922-23.

The season was a busy and a most enjoyable one.

The most important fixture for your Club was the Australian Universities' Cricket Championship, in which four Universities—Melbourne, Adelaide, Brisbane, and Sydney—were to have competed. Unfortunately Brisbane were compelled to forfeit to Sydney. Melbourne defeated Adelaide at Adelaide, and thus your team had the honour to meet Melbourne in the final at Sydney. In this match your team suffered defeat at the hands of the strong Melbourne side, who thoroughly deserved their success. The match was an excellent one, and the standard of play high. Your team was unfortunate in being without the services of its captain, J. M. Taylor, who was away playing for the State, and its vice-captain, H. O. Rock, who was incapacitated by an accident. At the start of the match, too, the team's slow bowler, C. H. Lawes, met with an accident that prevented him taking part in the game.

In the Grade Competitions of the N.S.W. Cricket Association the three teams entered met with considerable success.

The First Eleven were a little disappointing during the early part of the season, when, owing to various reasons, its full strength could not be got together; during the latter part of the season, however, it was successful in most of its matches. The team finished with the following record:—

The Second Eleven was again captained by J. A. Schofield, who, with the assistance of T. P. Flattery, worked hard to keep things going smoothly. The problem of the Christmas vacation is still a difficult one for the Club, for practically up to the start of the vacation both the Second and Third Elevens were leading in their competitions, and thenceforth fell away.

The Third Eleven, under the guidance of W. C. Gissane and N. Hughes, were a much keener lot than usual, and started the season well. The vacation upset them as regards standard and results, but nevertheless your Committee is pleased to be able to report that during the season a good team was fielded regularly, and the objectionable practice of forfeiting, as in previous years, had not to be resorted to.

Practices were held at the oval on Tuesdays and Thursdays during the season.

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Gentlemen,—

Your Committee has the honour to submit for your consideration the Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the season 1923-24.

The season was very successful, and a most enjoyable one.

The membership of the Club was very large, and there were no less than one hundred and ten names on the Club list.

Practices showed a very marked improvement. On the opening day of practice, eighty were down at the nets. During the first half of the season three or four nets were necessary every Tuesday and Thursday to provide practice for the large numbers attending. The numbers decreased in the

second half of the season. However, the members of the elevens were nearly all at practice regularly. During the season, the running of practices was fairly satisfactory, but there yet remains to be instituted some better method, especially with regard to the bowling.

Your Committee regrets that the Inter-'Varsity Cricket Matches had unfortunately to be abandoned owing to the very unfavourable time of the year, and also owing to the expense that players would have had to incur by travelling to Melbourne, with the possibility of having to stay there for two weeks. It is practically impossible for Sydney to play two consecutive matches in Melbourne. Melbourne played Adelaide, and this opportunity is taken of congratulating Melbourne University on holding the Australian Universities' Cricket Championship.

In the Grade Competitions of the New South Wales Cricket Association, three teams were entered. It is with pleasure that your Committee has to report a most successful season.

The First Eleven had a consistently good season, and were runners-up in the Competition, with thirty-two points. Manly and Waverley were on the same mark. This opportunity is taken of congratulating Gordon Club on winning the Club Championship, and also on the unbeaten record of their First Eleven, which won the Premiership.

GENTLEMEN—

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting to you the Annual Report for the season 1928-29.

The past season, though it cannot be counted as being among one of the University's most successful seasons, at least shows a marked improvement on the performance of last year. The First XI. has ascended from last position to that of seventh in the competition table, an advance of nine places.

This improvement is due to various causes, not the least of which is the fact that the bowling has gained by the inclusion of Cooper, hostility which it has lacked for several seasons.

An improvement is noticeable this season, however, in all departments of the game, which is no doubt in a great part due to the experience gained by the younger members of the team last season and by which they profited.

The batting on the whole has been more solid, and not so liable to collapse. Indeed for the first four matches it gave promise of being very good indeed, but thereafter fell off in consistency and became at time dependent on brilliant individual performances which did not always materialize.

On the whole, however, it gives promise of resting on reasonably firm foundation next year.

The success of the team was more often due to the bowling and fielding than to the batting as the season progressed. The bowling though not good was never innocuous by reason of the fact that fast-medium deliveries of Cooper who at times bowled like a match winner. The other bowlers could be depended upon to keep an end going without undue expense and to secure an occasional wicket.

And the bowling was aided by quite good fielding. Though the standard was not brilliant it was above the usual grade standard as it should always be, and lacked nothing that keenness could give to it. The ground work was safe and most of the catches were grimly hung on to and the slips provided a welcome change by picking up the majority of their chances.

The keenness of the team in general is worthy of comment and was no doubt a great factor not only in the keeping down of runs or of obtaining of wickets but in insuring its happy working. This keenness was appreciable not only in the First XI. but in all the teams and indeed throughout the club and was responsible for the encouraging spectacle of men toiling determinedly all the season at the nets though their efforts met with no reward from the selectors.

We may fittingly remark that the general keenness was reflected in the person of the scorer for the First XI., Mr. A. P. Cohen, of whose efforts your Committee wishes to express its appreciation.

The pleasantest match played by your First XI. this season was the annual one against the Veterans' team and this match and the subsequent dinner has become an event which is looked forward to by all members of the Club.

The Annual Inter-Varsity match was played this year in Queensland and resulted in a comfortable win for Sydney. Unfortunately your team was not able to make the trip to Melbourne so that this match was not played this year.

During the season the following players gained Representative Honour:— B. A. Cooper, N.S.W. 1st XI., G. C. Hogg, N.S.W. 2nd XI and 12th man N.S.W. 1st XI., J. E. P. Hogg, 12th man N.S.W. 1st XI.

The Batting Average went to G. C. Hogg, 444 runs, average 40.5.

The Bowling Average went to B. A. Cooper, 44 wickets at 14.5 apiece.

We take this opportunity of congratulating Western Suburbs on winning the Premiership and Club Championship.

## ANNUAL REPORT.

Gentlemen,—

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting to you the Annual Report for the season 1929-30.

The past season has been the most successful season that the Club has had for several years, and, in general, shows a marked improvement on the preceding season.

The 1st XI. has had its most successful and encouraging season for years. At the end of the season it shared second position on the competition table with two other teams, whilst last season it could only be placed seventh. This improved performance has come about as a result of improvement in all departments of the game, particularly batting and bowling. The outstanding batsman was J. Hogg, who headed both aggregate and average, and during the season scored two centuries, and he displayed great consistency, especially towards the latter part of the season. B. J. Smith was also very successful as a batsman, and scored one century. Other century-scorers were A. W. Ross and G. C. Hogg.

However, the batting has been characterised by the capacity of the whole team to score runs, and except for one match in particular has been very consistent.

During the season the team scored 4,357 runs for the loss of 176 wickets, an average of 24.2 runs per wicket.

The bowling, whilst not appearing strong on paper and appearing to be lacking in variety, has been quite competent to dismiss the opposition for moderate totals. Four bowlers have taken more than thirty wickets, each at a moderate cost.

The opposing side scored 4,496 runs for the loss of 193 wickets, an average of 23.3 runs per wicket.

The fielding of the team, however, has been inconsistent—at times being excellent, and at other times, for no apparent reason, it has been very disappointing. The same weakness that has characterised the fielding for the last few seasons was again present, namely, the poor slip-catching.

The Second and the Third Elevens have been unsuccessful as usual, both occupying last place in their respective competitions. It is hard to say what is the cause of the poor results of these two teams, but the same state of affairs has existed for years. They both commenced the season well, and appeared to have excellent prospects.

There was some difficulty in filling the teams for the matches played around Christmas and New Year, but on the whole this difficulty was not as great as formerly.

The only member of the Club to gain representative honours was J. E. P. Hogg, who successfully captained the N.S.W. XI. against Tasmania.

This season the full programme of Inter-'Varsity matches was played—Brisbane, Melbourne, Adelaide, and Sydney 'Varsities taking part. The result was a win for Melbourne, who played Sydney in the final at Sydney. Sydney first visited Brisbane, where they had a comfortable win by an innings.

Sydney then played Melbourne in Sydney, the match resulting in a win for Melbourne by 356 runs.

Melbourne University's team was entertained at the University Club at a dinner, largely owing to the generosity of old University men.

It is to be hoped in the future that the Inter-'Varsity cricket will continue to be played annually.

In addition, a very pleasant match was played against the Past Blues, which resulted in a draw. It is hoped that this match will become an annual fixture.

The University Veterans team reports having had an enjoyable season under the captaincy of Dr. Archie Blue. No country tour could be arranged this year.

The Veterans supplied the bulk of the "Past" side in the match against the "Present." They were reinforced by Messrs. Ray Boyce, Eric Barbour, C. Lawes, and J. Mould.

We would like to take this opportunity of congratulating Mosman on winning the First Grade Premiership and also the Club Championship.

## ANNUAL REPORT

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Gentlemen,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for the season 1930-31.

The past season has been disappointing in many respects, although the success of the new men has been very pleasing. At the end of the season the 1st XI. only occupied the twelfth place, in company with another team, as against the second place of last year. This can only be due to one thing, the poor support that the bowlers received from the fieldsmen and wicketkeeper on most occasions. The batting did not quite come up to expectations, due chiefly to the failure of the last four or five batsmen, though at times these men gave a good account of themselves. The outstanding batsman of the side was J. Hellmrich, who was a most consistent run-getter and who finished the season with a total of 862 runs, of which 800 were made in Grade Cricket, this being the highest number made in the first grade for the year. The Club offers him its congratulations. Parsonage was the team's best all-rounder, being very consistent both with bat and ball. Williams also lent great strength to the team, his bowling showed great improvement towards the end of the season, when he commanded the greatest respect from the opposing batsmen. The Club was unfortunate in losing the services of Smith half-way through the season owing to an injury.

The full programme of Inter-'Varsity matches was played—Melbourne defeated Adelaide, and Sydney defeating Brisbane in Sydney.

Sydney, however, sustained a heavy defeat in the final v. Melbourne in Melbourne, but nevertheless the team had a most enjoyable trip, and take this opportunity of expressing their appreciation for the hospitality of their hosts.

Two members of the Club (Messrs. Hogg and Parsonage) gained representative honours in the Colts' side which visited Queensland, Hogg being the captain of the side.

The annual match v. the Past Blues was played, resulting in a win for the Past Blues, due chiefly to the fine bowling of Dr. Bryce Cooper. The team was entertained at lunch by the Past Blues.

The First Grade Premiership and Club Championship was won by Randwick, and we take this opportunity of congratulating them.

The second and third Elevens again had a most unsuccessful season, but your Committee is taking active means to rectify this, and has a scheme in mind to obtain the co-operation of all cricketers in the 'Varsity.

Your Committee feels that the first step towards this co-operation has been fulfilled in raising inter-faculty cricket to a successful standard. The competition was won by the Engineering XI. from Dentistry in the final.

The success of this competition was chiefly due to the able control of the Club's Assistant Secretary (W. Wilson), and it is hoped that this success will continue in the future, when the Club should gain the benefit of the talent which this competition discloses.

Your Committee would like to point out that success cannot be hoped for in any of the teams without a high standard of team-work. This is borne out by Randwick's teams, which succeeded in winning each grade competition.

The Club deeply regrets having to record the death of one of its most prominent past members, Dr. C. V. Single, who was, up to the time of his death, a most active member of the Veterans' XI. We extend our most sincere sympathy to Dr. Single's family and relatives.

## ANNUAL REPORT

Gentlemen,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for the season 1931-32.

The past season has been most disappointing from the point of view of the Club collectively, but, individually, there were several splendid performances. The season concluded with your 1st XI. sharing with another team fourteenth place on the Competition Table. This poor result may be attributed to the dismal failure of the recognised batsmen of the team, and the poor support that the bowlers received from the fieldsmen in the first half of the season. The splendid batting of Hogg is deserving of the highest commendation. Scoring consistently throughout the season, he finished with an aggregate of 833 runs. Despite the fact that he practically had to carry the team's run-getting on his shoulders, he batted in brilliant style on all occasions. Seale was a distinct asset to the side, and secured 42 wickets at a moderate cost. He commenced the season in brilliant fashion, but, after Christmas, he was not so successful. Parsonage was the team's best all-rounder, but his batting suffered in comparison with that displayed during the previous season. His bowling, however, was remarkable for its consistency and sustained effort. Williams bowled excellently. He, perhaps, suffered most from the poor support in the field.

The full programme of Inter-'Varsity matches was played—Melbourne defeated Adelaide, and Sydney defeating Queensland in Brisbane.

Sydney, however, were easily defeated by Melbourne in Sydney, and we congratulate them on their victory.

The annual match v. the Past Blues was abandoned on account of rain.

We extend our hearty congratulations to the following Clubs:—North Sydney on winning the First Grade, Western Suburbs Second Grade Premiers and Club Championship Pennant, and Marrickville Third Grade Honours.

The second and third Elevens again had a most unsuccessful season. The thirds, however, showed great improvement during the latter part of the season, and succeeded in winning their last three matches. Your Committee hopes that this improvement will continue next season.

The poor results of all three teams are not due to shortage of players, as has been the case in previous seasons, but to the present low standard of cricket at the University.

Your Committee points out that the failure of your Club to apply for permits for men to play in a lower grade might have seriously affected the whole Competition Table, and it is sincerely trusted that this matter will not again escape the notice of your Club.

The Club offers its congratulations to Dr. J. E. P. Hogg on his selection as captain of the Queensland Eleven.

At the beginning of every season, for the last few seasons, your Committee has requested the Sports Union that the practice wickets should be available earlier than they have been, even if they were to be of a temporary nature. Despite the fact that there seems nothing to prevent their being available, they are never available until a fortnight after they should be. As in past seasons, the practice wickets have been almost useless during the whole season, and, unless there is some improvement in this direction, it would seem impossible to improve the standard of play.

The loss of the University Oval, last year, was a great embarrassment to your Club in the New South Wales Cricket Association, and this matter should be immediately discussed by your incoming Committee with the Ground Committee.

A Sub-Committee, consisting of Messrs. Webb, Hogg and Bryant, personally supervised the selection and purchase of material, and the result was much more satisfactory and cheaper than has been the case in previous seasons. Your Committee recommends that this practice should be continued. With the exception of the Inter-'Varsity match, Australian-made balls were used on all occasions, and they proved to be most satisfactory.

The Inter-Faculty competition was won by Veterinary Science from Medicine in the final. This game provided a close finish, as only one run separated the totals of the two teams. This competition was under the able control of the Club's Acting Assistant Secretary, Mr. Williams, and to him may be given most credit for its success. Your Committee has high hopes that this competition will fulfil its purpose of disclosing promising men for the Grade teams.

## ANNUAL REPORT

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Gentlemen,—

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for the season 1932-1933.

Once again the Club has had a rather disappointing season with regard to the Grade Competitions, but met with more success in other directions than for some years. The 1st XI. finished fifteenth on the Competition Table, while the 2nd and 3rd XI.'s filled fourteenth and fifteenth positions respectively. The position of the 1st XI. is due to a great extent to the poor support which the bowlers received from the fieldsmen, though on a few occasions the fielding was good. Seale unfortunately failed to reproduce his form of the previous season. The batting of the team was inconsistent, and the loss of Dr. G. C. Hogg's services during the latter half of the season was keenly felt. J. Hellmrich must be congratulated on his performance of scoring 503 runs at an average of 38.7 in only twelve matches. He also made a century in a super-grade match. Falk and Gee greatly improved their form towards the end of the season. Parsonage was again an asset to the team as an all-rounder.

We extend our hearty congratulations to the Randwick C.C. on winning the Club Championship. We also congratulate Central Cumberland on their well-deserved win in the 1st Grade Competition, and Petersham and Randwick on winning the 2nd and 3rd Grade Competitions respectively.

In the Inter-'Varsity Competition, Melbourne defeated Adelaide, and Sydney received a forfeit from Brisbane. The final match between Sydney and Melbourne was very keenly contested. Smith gave us a fine start by dismissing six Melbourne batsmen for a moderate total. Later Falk laid the foundations for the Sydney score with a very solidly compiled 124, and Sydney won on the first innings by 12 runs. Melbourne batted again, but Sydney did not have time to complete its second innings.

Owing chiefly to the Club not being able to obtain the use of No. 1 Oval at a suitable time, the match against the Past Blues was not played this season. Your Committee hopes that this annual match will not have to be put off in future.

The 2nd XI. was an improved team this season, very few points separating it from several other teams on the Competition Table. This team suffered a great deal from the loss of its best players during the long vacation, though great keenness was always in evidence. Owen did particularly well with the bat, and King bowled excellently until he was selected for the 1st XI.

The 3rd XI. had another lean season owing to inexperience, but was well kept together by Marks. Phillips was a very useful man in the team.

The Club offers its congratulations to T. G. Parsonage on his selection to represent the State against Queensland, and also J. Hellmrich and N. Falk on their inclusion in the Colts Team which visited Queensland.

Once again the Club has been greatly handicapped by the very bad state of the practice wickets on the oval. The teams cannot hope for better results when there is no incentive to practice regularly. The loss of the No. 1 Oval for Saturday matches was also a distinct handicap, but we are pleased to be able to state that the Club is to have full use of it next season.

A Sub-committee, consisting of Messrs Webb, Hogg and Smith, personally supervised the selection and purchase of material for the season.

A Sub-committee, consisting of Messrs Webb, Hellmrich and Rogers, was appointed to inquire into the question of the award of blues. A report was made to the Committee of the Sports Union, and it is hoped that some definite system will be adopted for the future.

The sincere thanks of the Club are due to the N.S.W. C.A. for the grant of £75, which was made at the end of the season. This grant was of material assistance to the Club in helping to obtain for it the use of No. 1 Oval for next season.

The Inter-faculty Competition was won by Science from Engineering. Ten teams competed.

The Inter-collegiate Competition was won by St. Andrew's College. Four teams competed.

The Veterans' Team had a very successful season, and frequently provided valuable match practice for members of the Club. Age has not dimmed their keenness. Dr. Blue (with him Mr. White) continued to act as captain.

Your Committee wishes to acknowledge the courteous and very helpful treatment which has always been received from the Secretary of the N.S.W. C.A., Mr. H. Heydon.

The thanks of the Club are also due to Mr. H. Aizlewood for the valuable work which he did as scorer for the 1st XI. throughout the season.

The Club is very grateful to Mr. Garnsey for the valuable coaching and net practice which several members enjoyed at the S.C.G.

Material to the value of £20 is available for the coming season.

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for the season 1933-34.

The Club has had a rather disappointing season with regard to the Grade Competitions, but once again met with success in the Inter-Varsity matches. The poor results obtained by the 1st XI., which occupied sixteenth position in the Competition Table, are mainly due to the failure of several recognised batsmen to get runs, although as only two tosses were won throughout the season, the team almost invariably had to bat on a rain-affected wicket. ## ANNUAL REPORT

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Gentlemen,—

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for the season 1934-35.

The Club has had a distinctly successful season, both in the grade competition and in the Inter-Varsity matches. The 1st XI. occupied 6th position in the competition table, a decided improvement on the performances in the 1933-34 season. More consistency was displayed by the recognised batsmen, as is shown by the fact that no fewer than three men secured more than 400 runs in the season—N. Falk, J. Chapman and J. Hellmrich. N. Falk, in particular, had another excellent season, scoring 577 runs at an average of 52.45, including two centuries. He is to be congratulated on securing selection in the N.S.W. 2nd XI.

The ground fielding throughout was good, with J. Chapman, K. Hooper and I. Vickery outstanding. J. Chapman and A. McMillan proved themselves to be excellent all-round cricketers, invaluable to the club. J. Chapman commenced the season sensationally as a bowler, securing 15 wickets in the first two matches, and, though he met with less success later, he was always useful. His batting improved almost as sensationally in the latter half of the season, and he made 411 runs at an average of 37.36, including one century.

A. McMillan was very consistent, securing 265 runs at an average of 26.5 and 24 wickets at an average of 23.5. C. King was the most successful bowler, securing 27 wickets at an average of 19.48. The success of the team was due in no small measure to the able captaincy of J. Hellmrich, whose keenness was exemplary. His loss will be greatly felt next season, and we wish him every success in the future.

We extend our hearty congratulations to the Paddington D.C.C., on its success in the 1st grade competition, to Western Suburbs for success in the 2nd grade and Club Championship, and to Glebe for winning the 3rd grade.

In the Inter-Varsity competition Sydney defeated Queensland, at Sydney, by an innings and 102 runs. N. Falk scored 106 and J. Chapman 57. J. Meillon and A. McMillan were the most successful bowlers. Adelaide defeated Melbourne, but as a match could not be arranged with the former, we played Melbourne, whom we defeated by 71 runs on the first innings. The outstanding man in this match was J. Chapman, who made 63 and 102, and whose slip fielding was amazing. N. Falk and J. Sweet were also successful with the bat, while J. Meillon met with most success with the ball.

The 2nd and 3rd XI's. were once more handicapped by the absence of players during the long vacation. There were, however, some fine individual performances recorded. Centuries were scored for the 2nd XI. by W. Fingleton and T. Glasheen. F. L. Owen was most consistent with the bat and J. Sweet and J. Meillon with the ball.

The Club congratulates Mr. Tom Ludwig on his work as groundsman. The match wickets have been good, and the practice wickets have shown a marked improvement.

A sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Webb, Hellmrich and Smith personally supervised the selection and purchase of material for the season.

The Inter-faculty competition, successfully run by Mr. Chapman, was won by Law.

The Inter-collegiate competition was won by St. Paul's College, with St. John's College runners-up. Four teams competed.

The Veterans team had a very successful season under the able captaincy of Dr. A. I. Blue, again ably assisted by Mr. A. B. S. White, and the Club wishes to thank them for giving its members valuable match practice.

Your Committee records with deep regret the death of Dr. E. P. Barbour, a Vice-President of the Club and one of the most brilliant cricketers ever to play for University. His death is probably one of the greatest losses to cricket in recent years.

The Club is very grateful to Mr. Heydon, Secretary of the N.S.W.C.A., for the courteous help which he has always given; to Mr. Garnsey for the coaching which several members received at the Sydney Cricket Ground nets; and to Mr. Aizlewood, for the neat and efficient manner in which he has kept the 1st XI. score book.

The Club also wishes to thank the members of the very energetic Ladies' Committee, which provided afternoon tea for the 1st XI. matches at the Oval.

## ANNUAL REPORT.

GENTLEMEN,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for the season 1935-36.

Last season the full programme of matches was carried out, the inter-Faculty and inter-Collegiate competitions, the Grade competition and the inter-Varsity matches. The Novices' match and the match against the Cricket Association's coaching team were revived. A match with the Quirindi D.C.C. was arranged. But apart from the Grade games, players showed very little interest in and gave very little support to the Club's activities. The inter-Varsity matches, in particular, which used to be and should be the most important matches of the year, show evidence of this. The Brisbane match was fairly well supported, five members of the 1st XI making the trip. In the Melbourne match, however, which was played on our home ground, only two regular members of the 1st XI played, and players had to be requisitioned from the 3rd XI.

In the match against the Cricket Association's team there were again two only of the regular members of the 1st XI playing, while the Present *v.* Past Blues match had to be abandoned owing to the lack of support of the Present Blues. It is true that many members of the 1st XI have positions in town, but if this state of affairs continues we shall have to consider seriously whether we should carry out our full programme in the future.

As regards performances, the Club has had a very disappointing season. The 1st XI occupied 15th place in the competition table, as against 6th place in the previous season. This falling off is all the more disappointing in that practically the same team represented University in both seasons. The players seemed to lose all interest in the game. The fielding was barely up to standard, and on one or two occasions was disgraceful. A. McMillan, J. Chapman and I. Vickery, however, were outstanding exceptions in this respect. I. Vickery, in particular, is to be congratulated on his remarkable fielding throughout the season. He took nineteen catches, including five in the Mosman match.

The batting was lamentably weak, and it was here that most of the matches were lost. The side's highest score was 203, and on three occasions only did the total pass the 200 mark.

The failure here can be attributed mainly to lack of practice. The most valuable batsman was N. Falk, whom ill-health prevented from showing his true form. One of the few bright spots of the season was the brilliant 72 in 59 minutes of R. Rogers, against Western Suburbs.

The bowling was the only department in which the team can be said to have been up to standard. C. J. King bowled consistently well throughout the season to take 31 wickets, and is to be congratulated on being selected and performing well in the Trial Match and in the Interstate Colts' match. J. Chapman and S. Yeates were a consistent pair. A. McMillan bowled very well in the last two matches, while T. Walker had a sensational spell in the Manly match to take seven wickets for thirteen runs.

Special credit is due to R. J. B. Parkhill for his brilliant wicket-keeping. He took 23 wickets behind the stumps.

We extend our hearty congratulations to the Mosman D.C.C. on its success in the 1st Grade competition, to Western Suburbs for winning the



2nd Grade, and to Randwick for its success in the 3rd Grade and Club Championship.

In the inter-'Varsity competition Sydney defeated Queensland, at Brisbane, by 350 runs on the 1st innings. Sydney's 583 included two centuries, 157 not out by I. Vickery, and 146 in 96 minutes by J. Chapman, which followed on an opening partnership of 157 by N. Falk and T. Glasheen.

When Queensland batted, S. M. Yeates bowled well to take six wickets.

We wish to thank our Queensland hosts for their hospitality and the enjoyable time they provided for us.

On the return trip we played a most enjoyable one-day match at Quirindi. Our thanks are due to the Quirindi D.C.C. for their hospitality, and to Mr. W. P. Nicholas for having arranged the match.

We played Melbourne University at Sydney. Sydney batted first, and scored 141. When Melbourne had lost nine wickets for 216, on account of the death of King George V the captains decided to abandon what promised to be an interesting match.

Blues were awarded to J. Chapman, C. King, B. Parkhill, N. Falk, A. McMillan, T. Glasheen, I. Vickery, T. Walker, S. M. Yeates, J. Hellmrich and R. Rogers.

The 2nd XI was the most successful University team, and finished 11th in the 2nd Grade competition. Five matches were won, three outright. The success of this team was mainly due to the keenness and enthusiasm of the captain, F. I. Owen, and to the consistent performances of several players who should be aspirants for higher honours in the near future. R. Turner not only headed the 2nd Grade aggregates, but in scoring a brilliant 201 not out against Marrickville made the highest score a University 2nd Grade player has made, as far as available records show.

Owen aggregated 334 runs, Fingleton, Hodgson and Harrington reached the seventies on one occasion, while Rankin twice reached the fifties.

R. Dalton, the most successful bowler, took 30 wickets. A. Alderdice, who, coming into the team late, took 26 wickets, is a very promising slow bowler. In the one 1st Grade match in which he bowled he took three for 46. W. Magney was a valuable all-rounder.

Prior to the commencement of the season the By-laws of the N.S.W.C.A. were amended so as to permit a graduate to captain the 2nd and/or 3rd elevens. The Club's thanks are due to our President for consenting to captain the 3rd XI. The results of this team were disappointing, but rarely did they have anything like a regular team. After being beaten outright in the first match of the season, they were narrowly defeated in the next three successive matches. They won the following match against Manly. Then the personnel of the team was completely altered through the inroads of vacation. However, there were several fine individual performances. The best batsmen were Henniker, who deserved his promotion to the 2nd XI; Delohery, who scored a century against St. George; and Chester, who compiled 96 in the last match of the season. Price, coming into the team late, showed distinct promise. J. Johnson was the most consistent bowler. Against Waverley he took six for 24. Searl and Hughes also bowled well. It is regretted that a full account of the 3rd XI's performances cannot be given, as the score-book has been mislaid.

Your Committee in the coming season is trying to arrange a series of matches up to December for a fourth eleven, consisting of those only who are able definitely to play throughout the vacation. This, it is hoped, will fill the gaps in the higher ranks caused by the annual vacation exodus.

The Veterans had a successful season under the captaincy of Dr. A. I. Blue. Mr. M. A. A. Kirkpatrick, who took over from Professor R. C. Mills, was a very efficient team secretary.

The inter-Collegiate competition was won by St. Paul's College, with St. John's College runners-up.

The inter-Faculty competition was won by Veterinary Science from Dentistry in the final.

Your Club very greatly regrets the loss of two of its most valuable members, B. J. Smith, who has retired to take up a dental practice in the country, and N. Falk, who has transferred to the North Sydney D.C.C. Both have been of great service to the Club on the administrative as well as the cricketing side. N. Falk has been Secretary of the Club. B. Smith has been Assistant Secretary and three times Treasurer. Both must be considered distinctly unlucky not to have played for N.S.W. Bede has been with us eight seasons. During this period he has scored, in Grade matches, 1,689 runs at an average of 21, and has taken 144 wickets. He has bowled over 1,000 overs for University. His best season was in 1928-29, when he scored 489 runs at an average of 40.75, highest score 144, and secured 41 wickets. In the following season he was selected to practise for the N.S.W. team.

N. Falk has been with us four seasons, during which time he has scored, in Grade cricket, 1,718 runs, at an average of 35.8, and in inter-'Varsity matches, 569 runs, at an average of 71, making a grand total of 2,287 runs, at an average of 40.12. His best season was in 1934-35, when he scored 577 runs at an average of 52.45 in Grade cricket and 106, 48 and 61 in three inter-'Varsity innings. The Club congratulates Mr. Tom Ludwig and Mr. George Chislett on their work as groundsmen. Seeing that the regular practice wickets had been temporarily damaged by operations of the Water and Sewerage Board, practice was transferred to the old practice wickets at the Newtown end of the ground. These stood the test very well. The match wickets have shown a marked improvement. No. 2 oval has been enlarged, and is rapidly becoming a

## ANNUAL REPORT

GENTLEMEN,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for season 1936-37.

The Club carried out its full programme in Grade and inter-Varsity competitions, as well as in inter-Collegiate and inter-Faculty competitions. The Novices' match and the match against the New South Wales Cricket Association, revived last year, were again held during the season, and a University team played an enjoyable game against a Western Graziers' XI. In addition, several fourth grade matches were arranged against City and Suburban and school teams, and it is hoped to obtain a regular series of matches for the 4th XI during the coming season. A most successful match between the touring M.C.C. team and a Combined Varsities XI was played at Sydney.

University improved its position slightly in the 1st Grade table, occupying 14th place. Nevertheless, the standard of cricket generally has shown little improvement.

Although most of the members of the 1st XI played regularly, the lack of interest in the Club was even more noticeable than last season. It was practically impossible to fill the lower grade teams during the long vacation, and the standard of cricket in the 3rd XI for a great part of the season was deplorable.

The inter-Varsity matches again aroused little enthusiasm. The game against Queensland was fairly well supported, but the Melbourne match nearly had to be abandoned. Three members only of the 1st XI made the trip, and so little interest was taken in the match that it was really difficult to get enough players from the 2nd and 3rd grades to complete the team. We were soundly beaten by Melbourne.

It is hoped that by altering the dates of these fixtures it will be possible to field a more representative team in future seasons.

The outstanding feature of the season was the Combined Varsities v. M.C.C. match. This match was revived at the request of the M.C.C. team, and was a success in everything but the weather. The scoring was very even. Our thanks are due to the English cricketers for their interest in the match, and it is to be hoped that it will not again be allowed to lapse. Sydney was well represented, Chapman (captain), McMillan, Glasheen, Vickery, Walker and Owen being selected in the Combined Varsities XI. Chapman scored a brilliant 57 runs in 19 minutes, and McMillan also batted well.

As regards performances in Grade matches, University's batting was again weak. On four occasions only did the team score more than 200 runs. J. Hellmrich headed the average with 250 runs at an average of 22.72, and T. Glasheen scored the greatest number of runs, 313. Glasheen's 81 against Glebe was the highest individual score of the season.

As usual, the bowling was of higher standard than the batting. T. Walker took the greatest number of wickets, 25, at an average of 23.16, while J. Chapman and A. McMillan each obtained more than 20 wickets. The fielding was generally poor, and many catches were dropped. Chapman and Walker were the best all-rounders in the XI, while Chapman captained the team splendidly throughout the season.

We offer congratulations to Balmain D.C.C. on its success in the 1st Grade competition, to Western Suburbs on its success in the 2nd Grade and Club Championship, and to Randwick for winning the 3rd Grade competition.

In the inter-Varsity competition, Sydney beat Queensland by an innings and 30 runs. Queensland batted first, and was dismissed for 93 runs on a rather sticky wicket, Walker taking six wickets for 33 runs. Sydney replied with 410, Vickery scoring 127 and Chapman 100. Queensland was dismissed in the second innings for 283 runs, Loxton batting well for a solid century.

Sydney played Melbourne at Melbourne. Against a weak team Melbourne, who batted first, scored 609 runs. Sydney collapsed in the first innings, totalling only 100 runs, but made a much better showing in the second innings, scoring 257 runs, McMillan, Owen and Fox being outstanding batsmen. Had the Sydney team taken all catches, the game would probably have been more keenly fought.

Our thanks are due to our Melbourne opponents for their kindness in entertaining the team.

The 2nd XI had a disappointing season, winning one match outright and one on the first innings, and losing eight. The standard improved noticeably towards the end of the season, but owing to the loss of players during the long vacation it was impossible to weld the team together. Hardcastle was the best batsman, scoring 208 runs, at an average of 23.1. Delohery and Hodgson also topped 200 runs.

Farrow and Dalton bowled consistently and well, Farrow taking 22 wickets, at an average of 18.3, and Dalton 22 wickets at 23.19. M. Yeates bowled brilliantly in the two matches in which he played, taking 17 wickets and performing the hat trick. On the whole the fielding was good.

The 3rd XI suffered greatly from losses during the vacation. Two matches were won and ten were lost. Henniker, Johnson and Peate, however, batted consistently, all scoring over 200 runs, while Henniker headed the aggregate with 271 runs, at an average of 20.8. The bowling was very weak, Dean and Searl being most successful, with 11 wickets each.

University Veterans had a successful season, under the captaincy of Dr. F. C. Rogers and Mr. A. B. S. White. For the first time for many years Dr. Blue did not captain the team.

The inter-Collegiate competition was won by St. Paul's College, with St. Andrew's College runners-up.

In the inter-Faculty competition Medicine narrowly defeated Law in the final.

The Club greatly regrets the loss of J. Hellmrich, who has left after many successful seasons with University. He has been a great performer for the Club since 1930, and has carried the batting of the 1st XI on many occasions. Captain for three years, he has scored altogether 3,465 runs, at an average of 30.08. His best season was in 1930-31, when he headed the grade aggregate with 800 runs, at an average of 47.05. He has played for the New South Wales Colts team.

The thanks of the Club are due to Mr. Heydon, secretary of the N.S.W.C.A., and to Mr. Garnsey, official coach, for their interest in and assistance to University; to Mr. Aizlewood for his excellent work as scorer for the 1st XI; and to Mr. S. Owen for his kindness in scoring for the inter-Varsity and M.C.C. matches.

The Club congratulates Mr. Tom Ludwig and Mr. George Eccles on their excellent work as groundsmen. Both ovals are now in their best condition, and the wicket which Mr. Ludwig provided for the M.C.C. match was remarkable in the circumstances.

Numerous improvements have been made to the pavilion, which is at last worthy of comparison with those of other clubs.

A sub-committee of Messrs. Webb, Chapman and Hellmrich supervised the purchase of material for the season.

Our thanks are due to the members of the Ladies' Committee, who provided tea for 1st XI matches at the oval throughout the season.

## ANNUAL REPORT.

### GENTLEMEN,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the Annual Report for season 1937-38.

The Club carried out its full programme in Grade and inter-Varsity competitions, as well as inter-Collegiate and inter-Faculty competitions. Regular matches were arranged before the long vacation for two fourth grade teams. These matches were well supported, and on one occasion seven University teams took the field.

The enthusiasm shown by members during the season far excelled that of the previous year. The practices were well attended before the vacation and the 1st XI carried out regular fielding practice throughout the season, with the result that their fielding was of a better standard than previous seasons. On the whole the standard of cricket showed a great improvement on that of the previous season, and the 1st and 2nd XI's should have gained higher positions in the grade table.

University occupied 13th place in the first grade competition, the 2nd and 3rd XI's gaining 14th and 15th place respectively in their competitions.

Inter-Varsity matches were supported more enthusiastically and teams of a more representative nature played in each match.

The Brisbane match was abandoned owing to rain, and Melbourne beat Sydney, in Sydney, by nine wickets. Sydney collapsed in the second innings, H. Zachariah obtaining nine wickets for 46 runs.

The performances of the 1st XI during the season show a marked improvement on those of last year, as is evidenced not only by the improved position in the competition table, but by the number of close matches which were played against leading district clubs. The batting particularly is worthy of mention, as on only one occasion did the side, when defeated, score less than 200 runs. Each of the first eight batsmen showed himself capable at various times of scoring 50 runs or more.

T. Walker was the most consistent batsman in the team, aggregating 348 runs for the season. His best performance was an innings of 52 (which won the match for University) on a wet wicket, against Randwick—a notable effort against the first grade premiers. F. Smith, who began the season in brilliant form, fell away later on, but nevertheless passed the 300 mark. His 89 against Marrickville was the highest individual score. J. Chapman, H. Flood and I. Vickery played several fine innings each, and W. South, besides keeping wickets in good style, was remarkably consistent with the bat.

The bowling of the team was sound, with C. McCarthy outstanding. It is many years since a University bowler has taken 40 wickets in the one season, and McCarthy deserves congratulations for this feat. J. Chapman, as stock bowler, improved as the season progressed.

The fielding of the side, apart from one lapse against Western Suburbs, was solid, and at times brilliant. Smith (outfield), Yeates (slips), McCarthy, Vickery and Chapman deserve special mention. The improvement noticed in fielding was no doubt due to the excellent attendance at weekly practice.

With the majority of last year's team available and several promising second grade players to be considered, University may look forward to the coming season with confidence.

Blues were awarded to J. Chapman, T. Walker, C. McCarthy, F. Smith, W. A. South, I. F. Vickery and J. A. Meillon.

Although the 2nd XI did not figure prominently in the grade table, the season has been one of the most successful on record as far as individual performances are concerned. A great improvement in the team was noticed after Christmas, and of the last four matches two were drawn and two won. The team's score in each of these matches was well over 200 runs.

The XI were particularly unlucky to miss an outright win by one run in the first match against Cumberland, the team being beaten on the first innings; also to be beaten by two runs in the Manly match.

Three centuries were scored during the season, two by R. Blackett (109 and 114 not out) and one by H. Giblin (121), both of whom batted brilliantly during the season, and both having an average of over 50 runs. Truscott proved to be a consistent opening batsman and Busby also batted well. J. Meillon was the outstanding bowler of the team; he obtained 32 wickets at an average of 11.8 runs. Busby, King and Alderdice obtained 18 wickets each.

The 3rd XI had a disappointing season. The team as usual could not be held together over the vacation, although the general standard of play was an improvement on that of the previous season. Only one match was won, two were drawn, and nine were lost.

J. Sweet was the most consistent batsman, scoring 240 runs at an average of 34.28, his highest score being 74. J. Hardcastle scored 242 runs at an average of 30.25, including an innings of 139 scored in 78 minutes. Of the bowlers Dalton was outstanding. Brown and Farrow also bowled consistently. Dalton secured 30 wickets at an average of 17.4 runs, while Hambly performed the hat-trick in the last match of the season.

The first grade competition was won by Randwick, the second and third grade competitions were won by Glebe and Western Suburbs respectively, while the club championship was won by Glebe. To these clubs we extend our congratulations.

The University Veterans had a fairly successful season, although quite a number of the stalwarts of previous seasons were unavailable.

On his return from abroad, Dick Rogers was a welcome acquisition, and proved a consistent performer with both bat and ball, while F. Prince secured 37 wickets at 11.4 runs per wicket.

It is hoped that next season men graduating will continue to play with the University in the University Veterans XI.

Congratulations are due to Ted White, son of Mr. A. B. S. White, a vice-president of the Club and former captain of the Veterans, on his selection in the Australian team now touring England.

The inter-Collegiate competition was won by St. John's, with St. Paul's runners-up.

The inter-Faculty competition was won by Agricultural Science. In winning this competition Agricultural Science was the first Faculty to win a shield donated by Dr. Holland. Dr. Holland very kindly donated this shield to stimulate greater interest in inter-Faculty cricket. The shield is to be transferred each season to the winning Faculty.

The Club deeply regrets the death of Mr. A. E. Tyler, who had been a member of the N.S.W. Cricket Association since 1911 and since 1915 has given invaluable service as hon. treasurer to the Association.

The Club wishes to congratulate Mr. F. M. Cush on being elected hon. treasurer of the N.S.W.C.A., and Mr. R. C. M. Boyce on becoming a member of the executive committee.

The thanks of the Club are due to Mr. Harold Heydon, secretary of the N.S.W.C.A., for his help to the hon. secretary throughout the season, especially in regard to the arrangements over the grounds for the two fourth grade teams at the commencement of the season; also to Mr. George Garnsey, the official coach, for his willing assistance to various members of the Club.

The Club wishes to thank the permanent scorers of the grade teams.

Mr. Aizlewood has scored for the 1st XI for some years now, and his services are indispensable. Master Bob Vermeesch rendered excellent service to the 2nd XI throughout the season, while Eddie Newton completed his fourth season with the 3rd XI.

The Club congratulates Mr. Tom Ludwig and Mr. George Eccles on their excellent work as groundsmen. Both ovals, despite the lack of rain during the summer, were in excellent condition. The Club would also like to thank Mr. Tom Ludwig for his willing assistance to the hon. secretary in keeping a careful check on material.

At the commencement of the season a Ladies' Committee was formed. Miss Sheila Graham was elected president, Miss Betty McIntosh, hon. secretary, and Miss Joyce Lotherington, hon. treasurer. By this committee's enthusiasm a most enjoyable dance was organized, which resulted in the Ladies' Committee being established on a financial basis. For their most welcome efforts the Club offers the Ladies' Committee its grateful thanks.

## REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE FOR SEASON 1938-39.

GENTLEMEN,

In presenting the Seventy-fourth Annual Report for your consideration, your Committee feel that certain features of the season's activities showed progress and that the coming season may be anticipated in a spirit of optimism.

The Club was represented by teams in 1st, 2nd, 3rd and District Colts grades in the N.S.W. Cricket Association, in the Poidevin-Gray Shield Competition, and against school, City and Suburban Association and other teams in non-competition games, which continued until late in February.

In the inter-Varsity games Sydney comfortably defeated Queensland in Sydney, and lost to Melbourne by one wicket, in Melbourne, after leading on the first innings.

Throughout the vacation and right up to the commencement of football training, practices were well attended, and teams were fielded during the difficult Long Vacation period through the excellent support of those who had played previously in the non-competition teams. During the vacation, particularly with the Poidevin-Gray Shield XI, which played its matches on holidays, there were many heartening examples of personal sacrifice to appear for the Club. This club spirit was most pronounced amongst the new members especially, and the enthusiasm of last season's recruits is a happy augury for the coming season.

**1st XI.**—The performances of the 1st XI during the season were satisfactory, and the team occupied a similar position in the competition as in the previous year. In several matches the team failed to consolidate its position when victory seemed assured. This can be attributed mainly to the "patchy" fielding and the lack of variety in the bowling.

The batting was very consistent throughout the season, only three innings yielding less than 200 runs (and two of these were on wet wickets). The total of 362 runs for nine wickets, against St. George, is the highest total by University for many years. In this match South (106) and Chapman (112 n.o.) scored centuries, these being the first centuries scored for three seasons.

South, who scored 528 runs at an average of 33, was invaluable as an opening bat throughout the season, and it is due to his sterling defence and "concentration" that the batting showed such consistency. Giblin's aggregate of 402 is also noteworthy.

The bowling was not as good as last year, although Jeffery and Yeates performed consistently and well. Neither gained sufficient support from the field, and Jeffery is to be congratulated on obtaining 28 wickets at an average of 20.36 in his first season in first grade. Solid support was given to these bowlers by the all-rounders Travers, Dettmann, Meillon and Chapman. Giblin performed creditably in taking six wickets for 21 against Western Suburbs.

At no time during the season could the fielding be considered excellent, and several catches were dropped at vital stages of various matches. Hughes (cover) and Smith (outfield) were two shining exceptions, the former being responsible for three or four batsmen being run out.

Although the lack of a fast bowler is felt, it seems that, in view of the performances of the lower grade teams and the consistency of the batting of the 1st XI throughout the year, it only requires an improvement in the fielding to enable the 1st XI to once again finish among the leaders in the competition.



**2nd XI.**—This team was reasonably successful, finishing seventh in the competition table.

The activities of the members of the side can be seen from a survey of the averages for the season, but it should be pointed out, however, that in almost every case individual averages suffered because of the willingness to sacrifice personal success for the sake of the side. This spirit made the team a very happy family.

Several members of the side are certain to be very valuable members of the 1st XI within a year or two.

In every match during the season our scoring rate was more rapid than that of our opponents, even when we were not in a winning position.

Another factor in the success of the team was the fielding, which was always keen, in spite of the inevitable mistakes which were made.

F. L. Owen finished his 'Varsity cricket career as captain of this team. His enthusiasm was infectious, and had much to do with the side's improved showing. C. J. King, a noted performer with the Club for many seasons, also concluded his 'Varsity cricket with this team during the season, as too did W. P. Nicholas, a very earnest and successful player. The rest of the XI will be available again, and last season's freshers, particularly J. F. Moyes, H. Hughes and R. Dunlop, should show the benefit of their experiences in the XI.

**3rd XI.**—Although the 3rd XI finished at the bottom of the competition table, their record was slightly better than it has been for the last few years.

Several matches were close: v. Gordon, lost on first innings by seven runs; v. Petersham, lost on first innings by 37 runs; v. Paddington, lost outright by three wickets; and a good chance of an outright win against Northern Districts was spoilt by bad light, play being stopped at 5.20. The team's best performance was in the last match, when they beat Marrickville, who came second in the competition, by 117 runs on the first innings.

The main trouble was the batting, collapses being far too frequent. Six times during the season five wickets fell for less than 10 runs. There were not two or three batsmen who could be relied upon to go in and make 30. In the later matches Todhunter found his true form and played some very attractive innings. He should do well next season. Fox also came to light at the end of the season, his stand with Todhunter against Marrickville, which realized 154, being the highest partnership in the 3rd XI for a long time. Of the others Blaikie and Harcastle were the most reliable, whilst Duggan and R. Staines played some good knocks, the latter using the long handle very effectively.

The bowling was quite fair, and would have been better but for dropped catches. The effect of these missed chances on a bowler is hard to calculate. R. Staines was the most dangerous bowler, with his medium paced spinners. Never did he lose his length, and he was always liable to take a wicket. Wilkinson's slow bowling was good, and he was sadly missed over the vacation. Robilliard bowled accurately, Dalton's left-handed deliveries were useful, especially against Northern Districts (3-33 and 6-17), and Duggan broke some good partnerships. The lack of a good fast bowler was sorely felt.

Vickery captained the team in the first three matches, and his batting and bowling figures speak for themselves.

The fielding was on the whole patchy, and this is a department in which every member of the team could have improved with more practice. At times it was very good, but at others it was definitely bad.

Although the results were not very successful, everyone thoroughly enjoyed his cricket, and a much more successful season is indicated next year. The Club was fortunate in having A. Tonkin as leader of this team. He performed an excellent job and made University 3rd XI a side to be respected once again.

**District Colts XI.**—The N.S.W.C.A. inaugurated a District Colts Competition for players under 23 years, with the exception of the captain. This team provided games for 38 players during the season, of whom 18 made appearances for higher teams. The only convincing losses suffered were against Western Suburbs and Balmain, for the games against Waverley, Mosman and Randwick were lost only by narrow margins.

Colts players who quickly made their way to higher teams and did well there were V. Golden, H. Hughes, W. D. Ward, R. Wilkinson, H. B. Todhunter, C. Begg and P. Robilliard. All these players were having their first season with 'Varsity.

The team's best score was 335, against St. George, and the highest individual score was V. Golden's 106 against North Sydney. We saw no better innings during the season than this knock by Golden. R. Wilkinson's 85 against Gordon was a match-winning effort, and other good batting performances were: R. Mills, 77 n.o., v. Randwick; C. Hambly, 73 n.o., v. St. George; A. Jackson, 69, v. Marrickville; G. Connor, 61, v. Paddington; and D. Ward, 53, v. Western Suburbs.

G. Brown had two good bowling performances: 5-45, v. Cumberland, and 5-69, v. Balmain. J. B. Stow developed into a very useful stock bowler. H. Hughes quickly won his way into the 2nd XI, where he bowled his leg breaks very impressively. F. Smith, an unorthodox left-hander, was another to show promise with the ball.

The fielding was fairly sound, but there is room for improvement. The tireless energy of Roy Mills was an inspiration.

**Poidevin-Gray Shield XI.**—The notion of breaking new ground by the entry of a 'Varsity team in the Poidevin-Gray Shield Competition was greeted with some scepticism. University's application for admission was vigorously supported by Mr. Frank Cush and Mr. Geo. Garnsey, and was accepted through the action of the Junior Union in entering a further team to eliminate the bye. As events turned out, only two of the team's seven matches were lost, and only four of the eighteen competing teams finished with more competition points than 'Varsity.

The success of the team was helped by other factors than the ability of the players, namely their enthusiasm, their will to win, and their readiness to make personal sacrifices to appear in the games. D. Hughes, for example, travelled from Bathurst for most of these games. The captaincy of Travers was thoughtful and effective, with his fielding always a fine example. The ground fielding was good, but the work in the air needs more practice next season.

The team's best score was three for 309, against North Sydney, when W. D. Ward and D. Walkom, our left-handed openers, put on 178 for the first wicket in 102 minutes. Walkom scored 175 n.o. in this match. He also scored 83 n.o., to play a large part in the outright defeat of Manly. F. Leventhal batted freely for 87 against the Juniors, and B. Todhunter scored a useful 81 in the last match, v. Gordon. Others to top the half century were: W. D. Ward, 67, v. North Sydney; D. Hughes, 58, and R. Blacket, 54, v. Gordon; J. Jeffery, 54, v. Waverley, and J. Duggan, 52, v. N.S.W. Juniors "B."

The bowling was well balanced, with new-ball bowlers who could make use of the ball, followed by a good variety of spin bowlers. Outstanding bowler was J. A. H. Jeffery. His best performances were 7-17 and 5-35, v. Manly, and 5-43, v. North Sydney. J. F. Moyes, in the two matches in which he played, distinguished himself by promising batting and neat wicket-keeping.

**Congratulations.**—Congratulations are extended to the following clubs on their success during the past season: Mosman, First Grade premiers; Waverley, Second Grade and Poidevin-Gray Shield premiers, and winners of Club Championship; Western Suburbs, Third Grade and District Colts premiers.

**Social Functions.**—The Annual Dance was held at the White City on Saturday, 22nd October, and was a most successful and enjoyable function, with Miss Joy Minnett and Mr. W. South as joint hon. secretaries. Our lady helpers earned the sincere thanks of those participating in the inter-Varsity match v. Queensland, at Sydney, for the afternoon teas which they provided each day. The dinner in honour of the Queensland team was held at The Union, and a happy evening was spent under the genial chairmanship of Mr. A. B. S. White. It was a great pleasure to see that Mr. Harold Heydon was able to accept the invitation of your Committee to be present. On the last Saturday of the competitions past and present players gathered at the oval after "stumps drawn", and a very pleasant function was held which, it is hoped, will become an annual event.

**N.S.W. Cricket Association.**—Your delegates, R. J. A. Massie and S. G. Webb represented the Club on the Association. Twelve meetings were held, with the following attendances: R. J. A. Massie, 9 (leave of absence, 1); S. G. Webb, 4 (leave of absence, 3).

**Sydney University Sports Union.**—Your Club's representatives on the Sports Union General Committee were J. F. Connelly and J. W. Chapman. Eleven meetings were held, with the following attendances: J. F. Connelly, 10 (by proxy, 1); J. W. Chapman, 5 (by proxy, 3).

J. F. Connelly was elected by the Sports Union General Committee to fill the vacancy on the Council of the Australian Universities Sports Association caused by the resignation of Mr. V. H. Treatt.

**"Past v. Present" Match.**—This fixture was revived, and a most pleasant game was played at the oval on 14th December. Past players recorded an easy win.

**Inter-Faculty and College Games.**—The Holland Shield for inter-Faculty cricket was won by Arts, from Agriculture. St. John's and St. Paul's again contested the final of the inter-Collegiate competition, but St. Paul's turned the tables with a good win.

**Appreciation.**—Mr. Tom Ludwig and his assistants, led by Mr. George Eccles, worked untiringly on the two ovals. The appearance of these grounds at all times reflected high credit on the curator. Outside his many duties as groundsman, Tom Ludwig was ever ready to assist the secretary in numerous ways, and your Committee is very appreciative of the assistance which he so willingly gives.

Mr. L. Philpott and Miss J. Smith, at the Sports Union, were untiring in cheerful co-operation with your executive officers. To them most grateful thanks are due.

Mr. Harold Heydon, secretary of the N.S.W.C.A., was a source of sound advice. His help, especially prior to the commencement of the season, was most valuable.

The provision of non-competition games was most essential for those who could not find a place in the grade teams, and the personal interest shown by Mr. C. A. Fairland, hon. secretary of the C. and S. Cricket Association, in this side of the Club's activities is worthy of special mention. Your Committee also desires to thank sincerely those school sportsmasters who provided such enjoyable games for our players. It is hoped that this link between the University and the schools will always be unbroken.

The duties of scorers for the grade teams were undertaken by the late Mr. H. Aizlewood and Mr. G. Quilkie (1st XI), Master Bob Vermeesch (2nd XI), Eddie Newton (3rd XI) and Master Denis Pecover (Colts). All rendered excellent service, for which we thank them.

**Broadcasting.**—Your Club was represented in three "Highlights of Cricket" sessions from 2FC, the talks being given by J. F. Connelly (twice) and J. W. Chapman.

**Coaching Match.**—Early in the season an instructive and useful game was played at the Sydney Cricket Ground between your Club and Mr. G. L. Garnsey's coaching team.

**Obituary.**—It is with regret that we record the deaths of Mr. H. H. Massie, father of Mr. R. J. A. Massie; Mr. H. Aizlewood, scorer for the 1st XI for many years; and Dr. A. I. Blue, one of our very well-known vice-presidents.

many years, played a most enjoyable game against us at the Oval in December.

With regard to the coming season it can be said that all members of the University realize fully that sporting competitions are now a very minor item in our national life. In spite of the restrictions imposed on the enlistment of many of our members, there is already a good proportion of them with the fighting services. Your Committee feels that the N.S.W.C.A. will handle the matter of next season's cricket with the judgment and good taste that the position demands.

**1st XI.**—This season the 1st XI at times showed a high standard of cricket, but its record was marred by disappointing lapses at critical stages.

J. Chapman, who again captained the side throughout the season, had the full confidence of the players and was largely responsible for the happy atmosphere which existed during the season. A "typical" captain, he did not bowl as often as he should have, as his figures prove.

The batting was not as consistent as last season, and the defeats which the team suffered can be attributed to this. South and Blacket were the most successful batsmen. Centuries were scored by Blacket (twice) and Hughes, while Walker was unfortunate in losing his wicket when he was 96 in the match against Marrickville.

Jeffery and Finley were the mainstays of the bowling attack, the former again heading the bowling averages with 35 wickets at a cost of 18-23. Jeffery was selected in the State practice team.

Finley obtained 28 wickets, all with the new ball, at a cost of 19-21 each, and Dunlop took 21 wickets in eight matches.

The fielding showed a definite improvement, particularly in the air, and at times reached a high standard. In the words of the Queensland Press, "the fielding of the Sydney team was equal to Shield standard". Further improvement is still necessary, however, particularly in regard to ground fielding and returns to the wicket.

South again performed consistently and well as wicketkeeper, being responsible for the dismissal of 20 batsmen.

The team suffered a severe loss at the conclusion of the fourth round when Travers (opening bat and bowler) joined the A.I.F. and Dr. Yeates, slow bowler, left for Queensland. Up to the time of their leaving the team had done very well.

After Yeates' departure the team felt the need of a slow bowler to vary the medium paced attack. A slow bowler is badly wanted in the team, and it is hoped that next season will not find the club in the same position as it was after Yeates left.

One of the brightest aspects of the season was the fine batting and fielding shown by Ledgerwood and Farrer who were chosen in the Firsts at the end of the season. This is their first season in grade cricket, and their performances show that they will be more than useful in coming seasons.

An appeal is sent out to all those students who can play for the University and who play for other clubs to come down to the nets next season and help to improve the standard of 'Varsity cricket.

**2nd XI.**—In spite of the fact that the team was necessarily changed considerably during the season, the Seconds had a fair measure of success, winning six matches, losing five and drawing two.

Although they finished the season with 54 points, they were only tenth on the competition table.

The season was an unsettled one, and players frequently had to leave camp to play. Lack of practice was therefore inevitable in some cases, and this, coupled with the fact that no real team combination could be secured owing to frequent changes, provided a big obstacle in the path of success.

The team played well throughout the season, 25 different players representing the Seconds during the thirteen rounds. The fact that the averages of the whole team were mediocre is only greater evidence of the solid play throughout.

Of the batsmen, Morris was the most consistent while he was not in camp, although both Wilson and Ward headed him in the averages. Ward owed his second place to a fine century, the only one scored by a member of the team, while Wilson, who had a series of "not outs", batted splendidly on occasions, and twice saved the side from defeat.

Apart from Dunlop and Busby, who bowled splendidly at the beginning of the season and later carried on the good work in the Firsts, Wilson was the outstanding bowler. His ability to bowl for long periods was invaluable in the latter part of the season when medium paced bowlers were apparently unprocurable. Any bowler who can take 40 wickets in a season deserves the highest praise.

Dunlop and Busby deserved their elevation to the 1st XI. Mention should also be made of Alderdice's splendid performance in taking all ten wickets against St. George when other bowlers failed miserably. His 10 for 62 was a great effort.

Of the others, Hughes was perhaps the best, although Gray, who came into the side late in the season, proved a very valuable man with the new ball.

The fielding generally was patchy. Sometimes no fault could be found with it, but on other occasions no catch was easy enough. Morris, Wilson, Ward, Fenwick and Alderdice were the best of those who played regularly, Alderdice taking 18 catches.

The team was ably captained by M. Truscott early in the season, and then by D. Ward, while J. Moyes led the side in later matches.

**3rd XI.**—The Thirds had quite a good season and have at last got rid of the wooden spoon held for the last few years, our total of 54 points putting us in eighth position.

The team had the distinction of beating the competition winners, St. George, outright, but oddly enough was defeated outright by Manly who finished last.

The inconsistent batting was caused to some extent by the inability of players to attend practice owing to their being in camp. At one stage we had six men in camp.

Whereas in previous seasons centuries have been practically unknown, this year there were no less than five, Golden scoring two and Duggan, Clark and Fox one each. The best performance was put up against Mosman when 391 runs were scored in 190 minutes, Golden's hurricane 130 being a masterpiece.

REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE  
FOR SEASON 1939-40.

GENTLEMEN,

During the last season the well-known cricket writer, Mr. J. C. Davis, forwarded the following to our President:

Extract from the "Australian Cricketers' Guide, 1858-9":

"SYDNEY UNIVERSITY CLUB.

"The Sydney University Club was formed in 1852, and consists only of matriculated students, who, however, do not necessarily cease to be members on taking a degree or leaving the University, except on expulsion.

"No analysis of batting or bowling has been kept and the match book is lost.—J. KINLOCK, Secretary."

It had been intended to include in this report a summary of the history of the Club which, in normal times, would have been an intensely interesting piece of research work for a cricket enthusiast. No apology is made for the postponement of this task till more settled times, and the age of the Club must be reckoned for the present at somewhere between 75 and 88 years.

Your Club completed the most ambitious programme of its long history despite the fact that more than two teams of players were in camp at Menangle with the Sydney University Regiment for three months. The liberal concessions granted by the Regiment to its cricketer members alone enabled the Club to fulfil its obligations to the N.S.W.C.A. The co-operation of the Regiment was much appreciated and we feel that the military efficiency of the trainees was, at least, not lessened by their Saturday afternoon cricket.

Five teams played in the N.S.W.C.A. competitions. The 5th XI played in the Municipal and Shire ("B" Grade), the first time a University team had played in this competition. A 6th XI joined the City and Suburban Association and played not only before Christmas, but also during the Long Vacation, and a team again played in the Poidevin-Gray Shield competition. Once again the Veterans fielded their City and Suburban XI.

Sixteen centuries were scored by our batsmen as against four in the previous season, the 5th XI were runners-up, the 4th XI occupied third place and a general improvement in performances and results was achieved. All our teams entered their games with a feeling of confidence that the district clubs would have to be trying hard to win against University.

Both inter-Varsity matches were won by Sydney, your Club being forced to accept a win against Queensland when our northern friends notified the A.U.S.A. that an unqualified player had represented them in the Brisbane match. A combined G.P.S. team, after a lapse of



Fox topped the averages, and Golden's 528 runs was an excellent performance. Clark proved a solid opener with an excellent defence and Duggan was batting well when taken into a higher grade. Dillon and Richardson, while they were in the team, played some good innings, and Blaxland, too, showed that he is capable of bright cricket.

The bowling was changed completely half-way through the season. Duggan, Jackson and Dillon were the nucleus of a very solid attack, but all left the team at about the same time. Duggan topped both aggregate and average, although he was taken into the Firsts, and thus played comparatively few matches. Towards the end of the season Clark and Hambly were bowling really well. Clark, with his fast medium swingers, bowled 75 overs for only 246 runs and took 16 wickets.

Hambly bowled without luck, having chances missed frequently and often beating the bat without taking the wicket.

The fielding on the whole was good, but at times chances were missed which proved very expensive. Blaxland was always safe, and his returns from the covers were deadly.

The loss of J. Duggan half-way through the season is hard to estimate. Apart from his individual performances with bat and ball, his captaincy was excellent and in his last three matches had two first innings and one outright win. A. Tonkin, who took over the leadership of the side after this, proved an excellent successor, carrying on the good work. He was largely responsible for the team's improvement in the competition table.

4th XI.—The fourth grade side this season creditably filled its part in University cricket. The team fought as a team, many an innings being unselfishly sacrificed.

Consequently little will be said of individual performances in the various games. Like other lower teams, the Fourths served as a nucleus for drafting men, in good form, into higher grades.

The tables show how solid the batting was, but comment on some of the players will perhaps not be out of place.

C. Duncan headed the averages with 27. R. Mills recorded two non-chanceless centuries in breezy style and topped the aggregate. A Jackson was the same bright A. Jackson. J. Stow, all rounder and hard-working team man, this season sparkled with the bat. G. Connor, Rock of Gibraltar, hit the ball mighty hard.

G. Gibson will be opening partner with Duncan in better class cricket when both realize "God gave us willow to smite a leather ball".

J. Fox, temporarily out of form, went up to the Thirds to make a century. E. Halliday, a good solid batsman, couldn't strike form.

Connor, with Stow early in the season, and later with Nairn, provided a good medium paced attack. G. Brown's off-spinners gave him the average and brought him early promotion.

In the first half of the season Hambly provided the slow attack (and car), but was too good for Fourth Graders.

Then came Fitzherbert, the wily man, to put up the remarkable performance of taking 40 wickets at an average of 10.8. It has been well said that Fitz.'s ball is as crooked as his nose, and its break as wide as his grin.

His faithful ally was R. Kerr, flickerer of balls. Hudson will soon be a fine bowler.

The fielding was fairly good, but it is a department of the game in which mid-week practice would make a tremendous difference, even more than in the team's batting and bowling.

The following is an extract from "Ditty on the Fielding Art" by Mills:

"Let not good bowler gloat, nor fine batsman smirk,

R. Mills proved a popular captain, and his team must surely have been one of the happiest any club could produce.

5th XI (Municipal and Shires, "B" Grade).—This was the first time University had entered a team in the M. and S. competition. The team had the best record in the Club, winning every match on the first innings, but an outright loss to Epping gave that team the competition with an undefeated record. This vital game was played in the second last round. An outright win was necessary for 'Varsity, who established a four runs lead on the first innings. Scoring 8 for 143 in 65 minutes in the second innings, 'Varsity closed, but Epping replied with 7 for 150 to register an outright win, which they thoroughly deserved. We heartily congratulate them on their fine performance in scoring 103 points during the season.

'Varsity Shires showed a fighting spirit in their cricket which enabled them on several occasions to turn what seemed certain defeat into victory. Most outstanding was the North Sydney match. We scored 110. Norths had 4 for 88, but were all out for 104 and we went on to win outright. It was this spirit of determination which brought victory in the Manly, Burwood and Gordon games. When we were up against it, someone would always come to light with runs or wickets. The large number of 40 players represented the Club with this team. During vacation the men from the 6th XI who came into the side played fine cricket. Outstanding among these players were: G. Gibson with 100 against Lane Cove and K. Lynch with 64 against the same team. M. Hall was another who came into the side during the vacation and whose all-round ability gave him a permanent place. A. Bull played the most exhilarating innings of the season when he opened against Northern Districts to score 89 in 65 minutes. His bowling was a big factor in the win against North Sydney. Before joining the Air Force at Christmas, K. Chisholm filled the rôle of opening bowler very capably and took some brilliant slips catches. L. Seward's wicket-keeping improved greatly during the season and his batting often got the team out of a hole. His best efforts were 56x v. Juniors and 41 v. Burwood. Other good batting performances were: T. Matthews, 156x v. Lindfield and 68 v. Roseville; J. F. Connelly, 125 v. Burwood, 64 v. Mosman, 52 v. Juniors and 50 v. North Sydney; A. McNaughton, 51 v. Glebe.

Promotion came quickly to bowlers who showed ability. The best individual performances of the season were: R. Staines, 8 for 57 v. Manly; J. Staines, 9 for 91 v. Epping; R. Hudson, 8 for 35 v. Glebe; R. Wilkinson, 8 for 60 v. Mosman; J. E. Connelly, 9 for 51 v. Northern Districts and 8 for 81 v. North Sydney.

City and Suburban XI.—A University team was entered in the City and Suburban competition for the first time during the 1939-40 season.

The results were very satisfactory. Of the 19 matches played, 14 were won, 4 lost and 1 drawn. The matches were one-day games and the batting time was shared.

No less than 50 players took part in the games during the season, and of these 27 made appearances for higher teams.

The majority of the matches were very closely fought out, three matches being won by 3 runs. The most convincing wins were by 210 *v.* Balmain and by 186 *v.* A.W.A. (return match).

The team's best scores were 288 against Balmain and 276 against A.W.A.

The best batting performances were: G. Gibson, 67 *v.* A.W.A.; E. Brown, 66, and D. McCloskey, 62 n.o. *v.* A.W.A.; S. Hewett, 61 n.o. *v.* Balmain; J. Allingham, 60 n.o. *v.* Old Aloysians "B"; M. Wallace, 57 n.o. *v.* St Aloysius' College; J. Williams, 55 *v.* Castlereagh; I. Lilley, 55 *v.* Cathcart; M. Hall, 54 *v.* Australian Accountancy College; D. Graham, 51 *v.* Old Aloysians "B"; L. Seward, 50 n.o., and A. Golden, 50 *v.* C.O.R.; and A. Lundie, 50 *v.* Barker College Old Boys. The batting was brisk and interesting on most occasions.

The best bowling performances were: R. Clark, 6-14 *v.* Barker College Old Boys; K. Farleigh, 5-25 *v.* Chemists; J. Williams, 5-28 *v.* North Sydney and A. Bull, 5-36 *v.* Balmain. Farleigh showed great consistency and his effort with J. Staines (4-16) in dismissing the Chemists cheaply was a fine example of accurate bowling.

The fielding generally was not good, and there is much room for improvement in this department of the game.

**Poidevin-Gray Shield XI.**—The P.G. side played six matches this season, winning three on the first innings, losing two on the first innings and drawing one. The team improved considerably during the season and provided splendid opportunities for several of the younger players, many of whom will no doubt prove their worth in the grade competitions next year.

The team proved strongest in batting and played very bright cricket throughout the season which reached its peak in the Randwick match. In this game, thanks to brilliant centuries by Farrar and Clark, the side scored 361 runs for 4 wickets in 180 minutes.

In the previous match against Gordon the side scored 348 runs for 9 wickets in 210 minutes.

Walkom batted consistently, scoring 316 runs in 5 innings. He was always aggressive and should do well next year in grade cricket.

Farrar, fresh from school, played in only three matches, but headed the averages and was second in the aggregate. He also was very aggressive and played shots all round the wicket. The experience he has gained this year should help him tremendously next year.

Clark finished the season in a blaze of glory. He improved greatly this year after a temporary retirement and as an all rounder will be a strong contender for first grade honours next year.

The bowling of the team was also good. The new ball bowlers, Finley, Gray and Wilson, all did well, and while the ball was new there were no big partnerships.

Duggan bowled his leg breaks enticingly and obtained 22 wickets, easily the most for the team. He took good advantage of the inexperience of the younger players in playing slow bowling.

The fielding, although fair, was not brilliant, and too many catches were dropped at vital stages.

McLintock, who played only in the last two games, kept wickets very well and obtained five victims against Gordon. With two wicket-keepers like McIntock and Moyes in reserve the University need have no fears about wicket-keepers in the future.

The team was a very happy one and all the games were played in a fine spirit, every man giving of his best for the side.

Improvement will not come about until every member realizes the necessity for regular and disciplined practice throughout the season.

**Congratulations.**—Congratulations are extended to the following clubs on their success during the past season: St. George (winners of 1st and 2nd grades and Club Championship), Western Suburbs (3rd grade and 4th grade premiers), Epping (Municipal and Shire, "B" grade premiers) and Glebe (winners of Poidevin-Gray Shield Competition).

**Social Functions.**—No dance was held. Players in the University *v.* Combined G.P.S. game were entertained at luncheon at St. Paul's College through the courtesy of Rev. Canon A. H. Garnsey. Afternoon tea in the same game was served by a band of lady supporters, and we have to extend our sincere thanks to Miss Joy Minnett for her organization in this regard and to Mr. A. B. S. White for meeting all the costs of the function. Mr. S. G. Webb provided very generous hospitality in the dressing room at this pleasant fixture. REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE  
FOR SEASON 1940-41.

GENTLEMEN,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the 76th Annual Report of your Club.

During the past season the Club was represented in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Grades of the N.S.W. Cricket Association, and in the Poidevin-Gray Shield competitions. At the beginning of the season matches were arranged for a 4th XI and a further team played in the City and Suburban Association, but, unfortunately, both teams were discontinued at the commencement of vacation.

The game against the Combined G.P.S. was again played, resulting in a win for the schoolboys. The usual inter-Varsity fixtures have regrettably been discontinued for the duration of the war.

A considerable number of Club members attended the military camp at Ingleburn, with a result that the Club's activities were somewhat curtailed.

The season has not been one in which we may claim joy through victory, although we do claim to have enjoyed the games, whether they were won or lost. If we are to improve our position in the competition table we must be prepared to give to cricket a little more than we have been accustomed to giving in the past. Practices last season were, unfortunately, not very well attended. There are very few who were seen consistently at the nets, and, by their figures, we see that they reaped the benefits of those practices. Many more members would do well to follow their example.

As to the coming season, it can be said that conditions will still be somewhat unsettled, with a result that some members of the Club will be participating in military activities during the vacation.

All Freshmen who intend to join with us in the game of cricket are cordially welcomed, and it is hoped that they achieve success and happiness in the games which this Club offers to them.

1st XI.—Starting the season with a team that looked extremely strong on paper, the 1st XI did not live up to expectations. The form of the team was inconsistent, mainly due to the fluctuation of teams and the marked lack of practice: this, we are pleased to say, was because of a large majority of the Club undergoing military training and those not so engaged were taking a much more serious view of examinations than in normal times. It is worthy of note, however, that, although beaten often, the team enjoyed its cricket, and if keenness alone meant anything it would have finished much higher in the competition table.

The match against Petersham provided the outstanding performance of the season. On this occasion the team was deprived of more than half its members and filled for the most part by 3rd Grade players and, notwithstanding, won easily on the first innings, mainly due to Clarke's great effort of 5 for 58 against a powerful batting side.

For the majority of the season the eleven contained men who have shown ability to score, even down to the last man, but almost every

innings played showed a collapse among the higher batsmen even though South and Leventhal usually gave the side a good start. These two topped the average and aggregate, South scoring 339 runs at an average of 22.6 and Leventhal scoring 367 runs at an average of 22.6. Apart from this pair the team showed a distinct inability to play fast bowling successfully. Whenever the bowling was accurate the batsmen found the greatest difficulty in maintaining a reasonable rate of scoring and would usually get themselves out through lack of judgement in picking the right ball to hit rather than through lack of technique. In other words, there was a definite disinclination to play shots, and, as a result, the bowling too often got the upper hand.

The bowling, although well varied, often lacked "sting" and accuracy. These faults were in evidence on the few occasions when opposing teams registered large scores. The fact is that most of the bowlers took an over or two to settle down, thus depriving the attack of its main weapon—the element of surprise. Dillon and Clarke proved bright spots in this department of the game. As the season went on, both men showed marked improvement and at times put up some excellent performances. Dillon took 28 wickets at a cost of 20.5 each and Clarke 18 wickets at an average of 21.9 each. The fact that both these players began their bowling in the team as change bowlers and, by the end of the season, had become the mainstays of the attack augurs well for University bowling in the coming season. The remaining bowlers all performed well on occasions and Busby's double against Northern Districts, 7 for 43 and 5 for 52, is well worthy of mention; this being one of the few occasions on which his consistently hard work was rewarded by deserving results.

On the whole the fielding showed a distinct improvement on the previous season's form, but, unfortunately, mistakes were made at critical times, causing at least one defeat.

South, as wicket-keeper, showed his usual consistent form; the few mistakes that he made were usually at the right time.

Jack Jeffery, in his first year of captaincy, had the full confidence of the team and was largely responsible for the happy atmosphere that prevailed throughout the season. His enthusiastic efforts to mould a team were unflinching, but, as the team was constantly being changed, his task was not an enviable one. His untiring energy and determination when "rolling them over" might well be taken as a standard for the coming Varsity bowlers.

Judging by results and performances, the 1st XI has had a bad season. However, judging by cricket itself, played as it should be played, when the game is the thing and not the score, the team has had an excellent season's cricket and we hope that the coming season will be as enjoyable and as interesting as the last.

**2nd XI.**—The Second Eleven had a rather unsuccessful season, due no doubt to the continual chopping and changing necessitated by the absence of some members in camp. At times it displayed competition-winning form, as when it defeated one of the leading teams. In the following match, however, it was defeated by one of the weaker teams. At its best it was a team possessed with unbounded potentialities; at its worst a collection of eleven players turning out for a bit of exercise on Saturday afternoons.

The batting of the team, on the whole, was not good, although there were some good individual efforts, notably by Farrar, Noble, Hilliar, Hudson, Duggan and Bourke. However, their scores were too scattered, and, as a result, the team's total rarely rose above mediocrity. Farrar, the only member of the Club to score a century,

has been fairly consistent with the bat and during the latter part of the season proved very useful with the ball. Finley and Todhunter failed to show the form they are capable of, although both compensated in some degree by brilliant fielding.

In the bowling line the team was always strong. The fast attack, comprising of Scott and Gray, with Smith as support, would be an asset to any team, and usually the opposition's early batsmen were dismissed in the opening overs. Boehm and Homer were useful medium-pacers, while the spin bowlers, headed by Dunlop and Hudson, supported by Hughes, Duggan and Hilliar, were quick to capture any wickets left over by the opening bowlers. Our opponents were usually dismissed fairly cheaply, but owing to our batting weakness, not quite cheaply enough.

The ground fielding at times rose to great heights, but the ability to take catches seemed at times to be practically non-existent. More than one of the centuries scored against us were due to four or five "lives". In wicket-keeping we were fortunate in having Moyes for most part of the season, and then very able substitutes in Bourke or Norton.

Players of promise who appeared in only one or two matches were Gibson, a patient and reliable batsman, Robson, a coming all-rounder, and Norton, who shows every sign of becoming a first-class keeper. During the vacation we had with us Alan Dick from Melbourne University and his all-round ability was very much appreciated.

The team was captained by J. Moyes for most part of the season, and his departure to join the Navy was a severe loss to the team. Duggan was then appointed to this position and quite proved his capability of leading the team. His ability in handling his bowlers played an important part in the early dismissal of the opening batsmen, although at times he might have kept his opening bowlers on longer. He did a good job; let us see more of it!

**3rd XI.**—The season was an extremely difficult one for the Thirds. Military camp together with the long vacation made such inroads on the resources of the Club that, for a time, there was great difficulty in even fielding the team.

At the beginning of the season the team was quite a strong, well-balanced side and, for four or five matches, was running well up in the competition. The batting was solid and some good knocks were played. Hilliar, Noble, Bourke and Boehm all scored runs before going up into higher grades.

In the bowling, Stuart Smith was outstanding in the medium-pace class. He bowled with "nip" and kept attacking the batting all the time. It is hoped that he will be able to play right through the next season as he will do well in the higher grades. Boehm has also bowled with a good length and has done well to go from the Thirds to the Firsts in the one season.

Slow bowlers Hudson and Hilliar had some good spells and could be relied upon to push home any advantage that the opening bowlers had obtained. Bourke's wicket-keeping was a great help to the slow bowlers as he made very few mistakes.

Unfortunately the vacation then started to take effect and most of the players either went up or were unavailable. The team then varied from week to week and the performances were disappointing. Occasional bright spots were apparent, but there was a lack of solid batting and good length bowling. Lilley, Lang and L'Estrange batted brightly at times, but on the whole all batsmen lacked consistency. This was largely due to insufficient net practice. Players cannot expect to make runs consistently unless they have a good amount of batting practice.

The bowling lacked nip or variety. Furber and Giblin tried hard, but were handicapped by the lack of good slow support. In the last two matches Gollan showed good form with his off-breaks and it is hoped that he will be a consistent player next year. Seward took up the gloves and proved his capability in this department. On occasions his batting was also well up to standard.

Captains varied just as much as the team itself, but the responsibility was finally taken under control by Halliday, whose enthusiasm had good effects on the team, although it still didn't achieve any further success.

Generally speaking, the need for net practice cannot be over-emphasized if we are to give a better account of ourselves next season. Batsmen will have success if they make the most of their ability and this can only be done by perseverance.

**Poidevin-Gray Shield XI.**—Although the team won three out of the seven matches it was perhaps one of the most disappointing teams in the Club. More often than not its potentialities on paper were good, but when it came to the match it just didn't seem to make the grade. As the team is composed of members from all grades and as there are long intervals between the matches it is very difficult to have sufficient combination to produce a winning team. If the enthusiasm dies, the team is certain to fail, and it is this lack of enthusiasm which was so marked in the failure of our team.

On occasions the batting was good. A few players, notably Gray and Dunlop, produced some latent ability and put up some good knocks. Both these men, being reputable bowlers, would do well to realize that this "second string" can prove very useful. In the 1st innings against St. George the team was absolutely routed, but in the 2nd innings Finley came to light with a 60—a good performance against such a good attack. Noble, Farrar, H. Hughes and Hilliar also made spasmodic attempts to score runs, but, on the whole, the batting was not as might have been expected.

At times the bowling was well up to standard—Gray, Hughes and Dunlop being the most consistent. Hilliar succeeded in getting quite a bit of turn, but not enough "nip" to get many wickets. However, in this sphere, as in the batting, the lack of consistent practice was most evident, and it is expected that the team will make an improvement next season. For the first few matches Moyes held the position of captain, and then later by Halliday—both men doing their utmost to produce a winning team.

**4th and 5th XI's.**—Both teams only playing about half a dozen matches, being discontinued at the commencement of the long vacation. The 4ths did extremely well, winning practically all their matches. Finley, Lang, Mathews and Lilley made some very good scores and Smith and Higginson succeeded in getting amongst the wickets. The 5ths were not so successful, although their keenness and enthusiasm were always present.

**University Veterans.**—The Veterans enjoyed a pleasant but not very successful season. Many of the younger players have enlisted and are now overseas and its captain, Dr. F. C. Rogers, did not play at all during the season, being engaged on military duties. The team was frequently short of one or more players, but played throughout the season, not only for their own pleasure, but in order to keep the team in existence for the men when they return from overseas. The team was captained throughout the year by A. B. S. White and, in his absence, Ken Asprey. Although severely criticized in every match by every member of the team, their captaincy was, on the whole, fairly efficient.

**Congratulations.**—Congratulations are extended to the following clubs on their success during the past season: St. George (winners of 1st grade, Poidevin-Gray Shield and Club Championship), Waverley (winners of 2nd grade) and Gordon (3rd grade winners).

We also extend our hearty congratulations to Major-General Sir Iven G. Mackay for the honour conferred upon him by His Majesty the King in recognition of his distinguished services.

**Social Functions.**—Players in the 'Varsity v. Combined G.P.S. match were entertained at luncheon at St. Andrew's College through the courtesy of the Rev. Dr. Cumming Thom. Afternoon tea was arranged and served to the teams by Mrs. N. Wallman (*née* Joy Minnett) and several lady helpers, to whom we extend our sincere thanks. Messrs. S. G. Webb and A. B. S. White also provided their generous hospitality in the manner of light refreshments.

The usual "End of Season" function was held at the oval on our last playing Saturday. About 25 members of the Club attended.

**Appreciation.**—Although severe watering restrictions were imposed during the summer, Mr. Tom Ludwig, as curator, very efficiently maintained the standard of the oval. He was ably assisted by Mr. George Eccles, who has now resigned after eleven years of service at the University. We wish him every success in his new employment as groundsman at Cranbrook School.

The Sports Union has given every consideration to your Club and we offer our thanks to Les. Philpott and the executives of the Union for their support.

Once again we pay tribute to Mr. Harold Heydon and his staff of the N.S.W.C.A. for their advice and assistance.

The very kind help of the G.P.S. sportsmasters in staging the usual G.P.S. v. University fixture is most gratefully acknowledged.

Past players continue to take a keen interest in University cricket, and the advice and support of your Patron, President and Vice-Presidents at Committee meetings and elsewhere were of the greatest value. Our Trust Fund has again benefited by donations from vice-presidents and past players.

**Inter-Faculty and College Games.**—The Holland Shield was won by Medicine—St. Paul's winning the Inter-Collegiate cricket.

**Broadcasting.**—Mr. W. A. South delivered an interesting talk on behalf of your Club in the "Sportsman's Parade" session over Station 2BL.

**Blues.**—Certain members of the 1st grade team have been recommended for Blues by your General Committee to the Sports Union. These Blues, however, will not be awarded till the July meeting of that Union and will be published in the subsequent issue of *Honi Soit*.

**Press.**—It is regrettable that so little publicity is given to cricket and other field games. From reading the newspapers it appears that the public is expected to appreciate the lesser turf and dogs, etc., instead of those games which are classified as Australia's national sport.

**Obituary.**—The deaths of M. A. Noble (father of Rod Noble) and R. C. M. Boyce have been noted with deep regret. Mr. Noble's death took place before our last Annual Report was published, but it was too late for notification of it to be included. There is no need for this Club to set forth the exploits of Mr. Noble as they are too well known. Let it suffice to say that cricket has lost a great player and mentor of the game.

The late Ray Boyce was a 'Varsity Blue and captained N.S.W. in Sheffield Shield, and was a delegate from the Gordon club to the Association. Shortly before his death he had resigned from the

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REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE

FOR SEASON 1941-42.

Gentlemen,

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the 77th Annual Report of your Club.

During the past season, the Club was represented in the 1st., 2nd and 3rd Grades of the N.S.W. Grade Association. At the beginning of the Season matches were arranged for a 4th XI, but were discontinued when vacation and camp interfered.

The match against the Combined G.P.S. was again played resulting in a win for the Schools. No inter-'Varsity fixtures were held.

The Club began the season with a surplus of players but military camp and the long vacation reduced this seriously till towards the middle of the season we were hard put to field three teams. At this period the Grade Committee granted us permission to play Graduates in all teams and we would like to express our appreciation for this as it enabled us to field teams for the remainder of the season.

One day matches were introduced during the season. These covered not only a solution to many of the difficulties created by men in camp but also provided bright and interesting cricket both for players and spectators. When happier times come again it must be debated seriously as to whether we should return to the two-day match.

The Club cannot claim to have had a successful season on results but we have enjoyed the game which is more important. If we can continue to do this and give our opponents good matches, then no season can be considered unsuccessful.

The attendances at practice were good early but fell off badly later. This was partly excusable this year as with the lack of water the groundsman had great difficulty in preparing good practice wickets.

As to the coming season, we will again have numbers of players in camp but we should be able to field our Grade teams and give those available enjoyable cricket. We hope that those men who are likely to be available through the vacation will stand by the Club and make the position of the incoming Secretary as easy as possible.

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## REPORT ON FIRST XI

The performances of the first eleven during the season were slightly better than those of 1940 - 41 season. The team finished level in the Competition table with Petersham in 13th position. The side was successful on five occasions, namely:- North Sydney, Randwick, Cumberland, Mosman and Petersham.

The most meritorious win was against Mosman runners up in the competition and created one of the biggest upsets in club cricket in recent years. After batting first and scoring nine wickets for 205 runs declared mainly due to a fine innings of 58 runs by Leventhal and useful knocks by Hilliar (35) and Binns (32, not out) we dismissed the star batting side of the competition for 167 runs. S. Smith started the run by getting 4 very quick wickets and ably supported by J. Jeffery who obtained 3 wickets for 44 runs, the Mosman side were soon back in the pavilion. Smith's figures were 4 wickets for 26 runs, very fine bowling indeed when one considers the opposition contained McCabe, McCauley, Gulliver etc.

The win against Randwick was also full of merit as Varsity batted on far the worst of the wicket. It was a proper "sticky", the ball turning and kicking most disconcertingly. The team declared at 8 wickets for 160 runs and Randwick, also a strong batting side, were dismissed for 110 runs, mainly due to the excellent bowling on that type of wicket by Boehm (4-14) and Dillon (4-37).

The most meritorious defeat was against the competition winners and club champions St. George. After recording 207 runs, one of the highest totals of the season scored against that team, St. George mainly owing to an excellent 134 runs by Morris declared at 8 wickets for 334 runs. This was one of the two day matches and on the second day, after the quick scoring batsmen were disposed of, Varsity with the idea of keeping St. George at the creases as long as possible, did not attempt to get the tail enders out. O'Reilly eventually saw through this subterfuge and closed, leaving Varsity 2½ hours to bat. The fact that O'Reilly, Lindwell and Christofeni together with the 3,000 barrackers could not force the outright, speaks volumes for the fighting spirit of the team. It is a strange coincidence that Varsity always seems to do well against the better clubs in the competition and then falls away very often against the weaker clubs.

The batting showed an improvement this season and every member of the side had the ability to score but, unfortunately, on not one occasion did everyone feel in a scoring mood on the one afternoon. The side sadly lacked a good first wicket batsman of the punishing type as often after quite a good start and the bat well on top of the ball, the opportunity was let slip and often the stage being set for a large total, the side was dismissed for what was comparatively speaking, a very low score indeed. Hilliar was the best of the first wicket batsmen tried and he was most consistent throughout the season usually getting into the 20's and 30's. He is bound to improve and towards the end of the season was playing shots that no one knew he was capable of. He should have a very successful season this year because he definitely possesses cricket brains.

Frank Leventhal is certainly the mighty atom of the batting. He scored 523 runs altogether for an average of 23.8 and reached 50 or more on no less than 5 occasions. He has every shot in the game and if he could curb his desire to hit every ball for four, would rise to great heights in the game. He is to be congratulated on gaining selection in the State Practise Side.

Frank Farrer also played some very fine innings. The manner in which he rattled up 47 runs against St. George left little to be desired. He is also rather impetuous and inclined not to pick the right one to hit. However, he has the right idea and it is pleasing to see him chasing the runs all the time. He scored 324 runs at an

average of 16.2. The team was unfortunate in losing Bob Clark who left to bat for a greater side. No report would be complete without mentioning his dashing 126 against Gordon. This was the only century scored during the season. The bowling was definitely the strongest Varsity has had for a few years. Stewart Smith and Eric Thew continued well to make what was one of the best opening combinations in the competition. Very seldom did the opposing openers score well against these two and congratulations must be tendered them on the excellent role they played. Smith bowled particularly well and finished with the fine figures of 30 wickets for 689 runs. His keenness was much appreciated and he was always ready and willing when called upon and no task was too much for him. Eric Thew although beating the bat time after time had no luck whatsoever and Varsity has to be thankful that they obtained the services of such a fine bowler and such a likeable chap as Eric Thew. Unfortunately, he is in the forces now and we wish him luck wherever he may be.

Jack Jeffery, the off-spin stalwart, finished with the excellent figures of 23 wickets for 519 runs at an average of 22.6. It was not until the latter part of the season that he found his true form. In the last three matches his figures were 3-44, 5-40 and 4-35. Jack has been the mainstay of the bowling for several years now and it is to be hoped that now he is Dr. Jeffery he will still find time, if possible, to play next season.

Jack Dillon was the most successful as far as wickets were concerned, his bag being 33. Although a little expensive on occasions he nevertheless put up some wonderful performances. Amongst his best being 8 for 126 against Marrickville, 6 for 133 against Paddington and 5 for 60 against Balmain. He was also a very useful forcing batsman and was perhaps the best all-rounder in the club.

Pat Boehm also came to light at the right time on a couple of occasions and was instrumental in winning the Randwick and Cumberland games with 4 for 14 and 4 for 27 respectively.

Mention must be made of Roger Dunlop's magnificent performance of 2 for 200 against Gordon.

John Yeall although only playing four matches was responsible for the North Sydney victory in obtaining 5 for 31. He has a magnificent delivery and being a shade faster than the average left hander should be a force to be reckoned with in future.

The fielding was far superior this season to last although many mistakes were made. It was pleasing to see so many difficult catches taken and shining examples as far as these were concerned were Jeffery, Binns, Farrar and Dillon. The side lacked good slip men and these were essential with such bowlers as Smith and Thew. Players would also be well advised to go for a ball with two hands instead of one where possible and also not to wander from the positions in which they are placed.

The team was captained at the beginning of the season by Jack Jeffery who kept up the high standard he had set the previous year. However, under pressure of Final Degree Medicine he resigned and the job was taken over by Wal South. Wall made an excellent job of the captaincy keeping the side together well and making use of his excellent knowledge of cricket. As a player Wal had his best season with the Club and his value to the team was immeasurable. He scored 665 at an average of 30.2. On numerous occasions he held the side together when wickets were falling rapidly around him. In addition he kept very well allowing few byes despite large scores against us.



In conclusion, Varsity has had a very good and enjoyable season although not as successful as one would have desired. The team works well together and showed excellent team spirit and played cricket as it should be played by placing the game in the higher sphere and not worrying so much about the results. An appeal is made to all those students who can play for Varsity and who play for other clubs to come down to the nets next season and help to improve the standard of University Cricket.

### 2nd XI.

The second Eleven began the season quite well but fell off badly later no doubt due to the continual changes in the team necessitated by camp. The team work which is essential for continued success was difficult to attain when frequently the team was selected only on the morning of the match. The changes will be appreciated by the fact we played 39 players in this grade.

The batting was inconsistent. Early in the season there were some very bright patches notably Noble's 104 against Marrickville and Robson's 166 not out against Mosman. These were two particularly few knocks. Hilliar also batted consistently well at this period. Later the batting was on the whole poor though Farrington, Ramsay, Farmer and Cameron played a few bright innings.

In bowling the team was much more consistent and most teams were dismissed for reasonable totals. Gray was the most successful bowler taking 32 wickets at a shade under 15 each. He was particularly hostile in his early overs and frequently took good wickets early. However, the other opening bowler, had less success with 14 wickets but was consistent. Both opening men lost wickets by poor fielding in the slips.

The slow men Dunlop with 30 wickets at 19.3 was the most successful. He bowled particularly well in patches but at times bowled off the pitch. Duggan bowled well in the matches he was available taking 18 wickets at 15. He turned the ball a lot and took some of his wickets with his particularly hostile wrong'un. Hudson also took 18 wickets with his off-spinners.

The fielding was not good though there were some purple patches. Gray took some good catches in slips while Homer was an example to all in his fielding and throwing. The keepers Norton and Farmer were solid though neither had the practice necessary to reach his best form.

Hilliar captained the team early and after numerous changes Farmer took over towards the end of the season. Both did good jobs under difficult circumstances.

### 3rd XI

This team had similar experiences to the 2nd but to a worse degree. It had some successes early but after a few rounds the team was seldom recognisable from week to week. In all 53 players turned out for this team during the season.

In the batting Matthews with 329 runs and Wilkinson with 287 were the most successful batsmen. They scored runs consistently despite bad wickets and often little assistance from the other batsmen. J. Furber while available batted solidly and consistently. L'Estrange, Farmer and Busby also made runs on occasions but lacked consistency.

Fred Smith was the most successful bowler taking 36 wickets at 14.6 each. He kept his slow left handers up to the batsmen and turned the ball each way. Gallagher, Hagan and L'Estrange each took about 15 wickets. All bowled a good length without being particularly hostile. Williams, although he played only a few

matches, was the hostile opening bowler getting left from the wicket and moving the wall away from the batsmen.

With regard to this team particularly we would like to thank those players who filled in places when we were short and those who despite lack of success were always keen to turn out for the game.

Last but not least we wish to thank our patron Mr. A.B.S. White and our President Mr. Webb for playing for us when we were in difficulties and giving us advantage of their experience on many cricket fields. Although both are consistent players with the Veterans, Mr. White had not played for the Club since the early years of the Century. Both showed they retained their form with bat and ball.

#### University Veterans.

The Veterans played a reduced number of matches during the season. With enlistments and the pressure of work on those available the team had difficulty in fielding full teams. In addition members of the team played in the Grade teams when the Club was short of men. Despite their difficulties the games were enjoyable if not always successful.

#### Congratulations.

Congratulations are extended to the following clubs on their success during the past season. St. George (winners of 1st. Grade and Club Championship). Waverley (winners of 2nd Grade) and Balmain and Gordon (joint winners of 3rd Grade).

We also extend our hearty congratulations to our Vice-Presidents, Major Ian Vickery and Lieutenant Jack Chapman on their respective marriages.

#### Social Functions.

On the day of the Varsity V Combined G.P.S. match, afternoon tea was arranged and served to the teams by Miss Helen Minnett and several lady helpers to whom we extend our sincerest thanks.

#### Appreciation.

Although faced by almost unsurmountable difficulties due to water restrictions, Mr. Tom Ludwig, as curator, managed to prepare good wickets throughout the season.

The Sports Union has given every consideration to your Club and we offer our thanks to Les. Philpott and the executives of the Union for their support.

We again pay tribute to Mr. Harold Heydon and his staff of the N.S.W.C.A. for their advice and assistance.

The very kind help of the G.P.S. sports masters in staging the usual G.P.S. V. University fixture is most gratefully acknowledged.

Past players continue to take a keen interest in University cricket and the advice and support of your Patron, President and Vice-Presidents at Committee meetings and elsewhere were of the greatest value.

#### J. F. Connolly.

We were very pleased to hear Jack Connolly has been reported to be a prisoner of war after being on the missing list for some time. All who played with the Club in his time appreciate the grand work he did and hope he will play with us again in happier times.

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REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE

FOR SEASON 1942-43

Gentlemen:

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the 78th Annual General Report of your Club.

During the past season your Club was represented in the 1st., 2nd. and 3rd Grades of the N.S.W. Cricket Association's Grade Competition. At the beginning of the season a match for a 4th XI was arranged against the King's School.

The annual match against Combined G.P.S. was abandoned because of rain and unfortunately no other date could be decided upon.

At the beginning of the season there was a surplus of players, but during the Christmas vacation our numbers fell considerably and on one occasion the third grade game had to be forfeited. Once again graduates were allowed to play, and the Committee wishes to thank all of those who helped keep our three teams in the field. The vacation was much shorter than usual with the result that the teams were not disrupted as much as normally.

One day matches were played throughout the season, but University appears to be unable to adapt themselves to the conditions of this type of cricket. Repeatedly we lost matches through our inability to score runs at a reasonable pace, although towards the end of the season quite a number of batsmen played brighter cricket. Your Committee hopes that in the coming year our bowlers will not have such a difficult task as they had in the past season.

The results of matches played were, as a whole, a little more promising than usual, but until there is more team spirit amongst the players we cannot hope to gain any marked success. Nevertheless the improvement through all three teams suggests that the standard of cricket may at long last be on the upgrade. It is pleasing to note that our biggest success was in the grade championships, where we rose from last in the previous season to twelfth in the 1942-43 season.

At the beginning of the season dry weather interfered with both the practice and match wickets, but the drought broke in time to save the oval and a misunderstanding with the N.S.W.C.A. Attendances at practice were very disappointing and until players have more interest in this department of the game, we will not achieve the success expected of us.

During the season some quite good attendances were recorded, the best being against St. George when £31.10.0 was taken at the gate.



For the second year in succession the performances showed a slight improvement on those of the previous season, 'Varsity being placed twelfth in the competition compared with thirteenth in 1941-2. We were successful in winning eight matches and had luck favoured us just a little more, several others would have been recorded.

The match against Paddington was the most exciting played for many seasons, the issue being in doubt till the last over. We were finally successful, though their last wicket fell when they needed but seven runs. Other exciting matches were those against St. George where our batsmen failed miserably chasing a score of 94, and against Waverly who in reply to our total of 131 they had at one stage lost 5 - 22. Our chances on this occasion were ruined by mistakes in the field. As in previous years we were much more successful against the better teams in the Competition than those lower down the ladder.

The batsmen this year did not score as consistently as is necessary for a team to have its fair share of success. No batsmen scored over five hundred runs, and only three, Leventhal, Farrar and South topped the four hundred mark. The only century registered was that of Leventhal who scored 100 against Manly. Next was a very solid 71 by South, but possibly the best batting displays were those of Farrar and Duncan in the second match against St. George. Duncan's 51 included a beautiful off drive for six off Longbottom and in Farrar's were many fine fours off O'Reilly. Other good individual efforts were Noble's 65 against Glebe, Ring's 47 and several fighting knocks by Dunlop. The form of Hilliar and Binns was very much below that expected of them - both appear to have plenty of scoring shots but are weak in their defensive play. Smith displayed his usual form. The match against Petersham was one of the few in which the team played as they should, both batsmen and bowlers putting everything they possessed into the game. Our batsmen particularly were very much on form, scoring 257 for 6 wickets before declaring.

The bowling, though very successful on many occasions, did not have much variety. This was partly due to the consistently low scores compiled by our batsmen thus making it necessary for the faster bowlers to do rather more than their share. This is a great pity but cannot be rectified until our batsmen are more enterprising. Smith and Ring were the spearhead of the attack and between them took 99 wickets of which the former took 59 at a cost of less than 18 runs a wicket. Other bowlers to gain any degree of success were Dunlop (24), Jeffery (25) and Bruce-Smith (18). Best individual efforts were those of Ring who on two occasions took six wickets in an innings and Smith who took the hat trick against Manly. He also took six wickets in the match against St. George when they were dismissed for 94.

Though the team possessed several reliable fieldsmen, the standard on the whole was considerably below that of first grade. This is largely due to the fact that very few members practice as they should and thus it is inevitable that the fielding is so disgraceful.

#### REPORT ON SECOND XI.

During the season some excellent performances were registered by the members of this eleven, particularly in the bowling department. The team improved its position considerable compared with previous years being tenth on the competition table. This was largely due to the team spirit displayed, although added to this there was a marked improvement in the bowling.

As in previous years the batting was most inconsistent and it was only on a very few occasions that a score exceeding 120 was

compiles. Wilkinson before he was promoted to the firsts was the most successful scoring 307 runs at an average of 23.5. Other rungetters of note were Robson (328), Westaway (312) and Butler (279). Duncan played a very entertaining knock of 100 early in the season, whilst Walkon's 86 and Lindsay's 65 were creditable performances.

The figures obtained by the bowlers are very encouraging but unfortunately next year we will be without the services of several of these men. Hudson (47 wickets at 12.2) was always a danger to opposing batsmen, whilst Robson (38 at 11.4) and Gray (38 at 14.7) proved themselves a hostile opening attack. F. Smith (29 at 12.5) also bowled with success. As in other teams the fielding was much below standard.

### REPORT ON THIRD XI.

This eleven was greatly affected by the numerous changes which were continually being made owing to scarcity of players in evidence during portions of the season. As a result there were very few "regulars" and the team must be congratulated on the way they fought on against great odds.

Probably the best "find" of the season was Newman who unfortunately played only a few games, but his performances suggest that he will be a tower of strength to the Club during the coming season. He is a very forcing batsman and his century in the last round was a very fine effort. Nevell was the most consistent bowler in the team and it is rather surprising that he did not capture more wickets than he did. Probably dropped chances played the biggest part in ruining his chances of success.

### Congratulations.

Congratulations are extended to the following clubs on their success during the past season. St. George (winners of 1st. and 2nd grade and Club Championship), Randwick winners of 3rd grade and Bexley "A" in the Shires Competition.

The Committee also wishes to congratulate those men who were awarded Blues for 1942-43 season. They are:- G. S. Smith, F. Leventhal, R. Dunlop, F. Farrar, F. Ring and W. A. South.

### On Active Service.

It is with deep regret that we have learned of the deaths of Major Ian Vickery, Major H. Holland and Captain Foley on active service. Along with the relatives of these men we sympathise with Norman Falk who is a prisoner of war on the death of his mother.

### Appreciation.

Mr. Tom Ludwig, our groundsman as in previous years was very patient with the Secretary and other members of the Club, especially on the day set down for the annual G.P.S. match. The wickets prepared by him were of their normal excellent standard and the oval, according to many experienced sportsmen, never looked better.

The Sports Union has given every consideration to your Club and we offer our thanks to Miss Hodgson and the executives of the Union for their support.

Mr. Eldershaw who did more than his share in arranging the annual G.P.S. match. We regret that his splendid efforts were "washed out".

The N.S. F.C.A. and Mr. Heydon in particular for his assistance and patience.

The Patron and President for kindly offering to pay expenses incurred by the G.P.S. match. Also the Vice-Presidents who continued to take an interest in your Club.

Finally the Committee wishes to thank the girls concerned in the preparing of an excellent afternoon tea during the last round and also for their loyal support throughout the season. We hope that even if our performances cannot the members of the Club will continue to interest them.

Inter-Faculty and College Games.

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REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE

FOR SEASON 1943-44

Gentlemen:

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the 79th Annual General Report of your Club.

During the past season your Club was represented in the three grades of the N.S.W. Cricket Association's District Competition and also by a fourth team which participated in the Shire's Competition.

The Annual match against the Combined G.P.S. eleven was a great success and after a very exciting tussle the Boys once again proved their superiority.

One day matches were played throughout the season and as in previous seasons our players were incapable of adapting themselves to this new type of cricket. It appears that while one day cricket is in vogue University will not be able to turn out teams which are able to do justice to their natural ability. Unlike other clubs we do not possess seasoned players to coach our younger members and, as a result, a host of "sloggers" and medium paced bowlers are developing in the teams. This deplorable state of affairs must not continue and your Committee hopes that in the near future the services of one of Australia's leading cricketers will be obtained as a coach for our players.

As usual there was a surplus of players at the beginning of the season but towards the close great difficulty was experienced in filling all grade teams. However, on only one occasion during the vacation did the Selection Committee deem it advisable to forfeit a match for the 4th eleven. Thus on the whole the keenness of players was much greater than last year when it was found difficult to keep three teams in the competition. On several occasions the services of graduates were called in and your committee wishes to thank all those who turned out so graciously in our hour of need.

The results obtained throughout the season were very disappointing and except for the 2nd eleven all grades finished last in their respective competitions. Lack of practice was partly the reason for our failures but more especially is the absence of a coach felt.

Once again attendances at matches were larger than pre-war years and it is hoped that our members will endeavour to play the type of cricket which appeals to the real sportsmen in the public.

During 1943-44, the first grade side failed to maintain the improved standard of the previous season and finished a succession of inglorious defeats by gaining the "wooden spoon" after a close match with Northern Districts. Though only five wins and one tie were recorded, the team was rather unfortunate on several occasions and a little improvement might have changed a number of close defeats into victories and enabled it to secure a higher position in the competition table.

Once more University displayed the usual inconsistency of previous first grade sides. Against the more powerful teams the keenest opposition was offered, and often the results of these matches were close; against the more lowly placed sides University regularly collapsed and was hopelessly defeated. For example, in the two matches against Randwick, who finished the season sixth in the Competition, the firsts rose to the occasion admirably, in the first round securing a tie, in the second being defeated by a margin of only five runs.

In the main the failures of the team may be attributed to weakness in batting, which very rarely reached first grade standard. Unless batsmen, who can be relied upon to put together a total of over 175 each week, are found, the prospects for future success are not bright. Far too much strain will still be placed on the very few class bowlers in the team. Undoubtedly, one-day cricket has contributed in no small measure to the decline of University's fortunes but over-sluggish batting and constant failure to make runs are the result rather of lack of practice than of any other cause.

Dwyer, alone, scored consistently and well throughout the season and had his services not been available to save the team from collapse time and time again, the occasions on which the score reached the century would have been few and far between. His aggregate was 479 and included scores of 67, 62, 45 and 44. Farrer did not display the consistency and confidence of previous seasons in his batting, though his aggregate of 370 included some fine efforts in matches where runs were most needed. Ring came to light as a successful batsman and compiled 305 runs during the season usually scoring quickly. The best individual score was Noble's 74 not out against Glebe, and after this left-hander's good performances in the early rounds his loss to the R.A.A.F. was felt rather heavily. Lindsay, who was perhaps unfortunate in not being promoted to first grade earlier in the season, gave some fine batting performances in the last few rounds, scoring a very bright 66 in 57 minutes (including 10 fours) in the last match against Northern Districts. Stenmark was handicapped by having to bat fairly late in the innings, so that too often he was required to go for the runs. His lusty hitting would have aided the team to a much greater extent, if the position had been consolidated more securely before him by brisk but solid openers. Leventhal played one very fine innings in the few matches in which he appeared, but his form was not up to standard. Binns, Hilliar and others did not come up to expectations, often through lack of sound practice.

The majority of the bowling fell on the opening attack Smith and Ring, who once again justified the claim that they were among the best opening pairs in Sydney grade cricket. Smith, whose fine work in the earlier rounds secured his selection in the Association team which played Combined Services, was called upon to take too much of the weight of the attack. Only a first class bowler with tireless energy, and great hearted team spirit could have endured the strain placed upon him. He and Ring between them took 99 wickets, the former 60 at an average of 18, the latter 39 at a cost of 22. Hilliar (23) and Dwyer (11) provided the usual support, while Nevell who was promoted towards the close of the season bowled well enough to suggest that he will be successful in future first grade side. Best individual efforts were those of Smith (6 wickets twice) and Ring (6 wickets). However, the chief want of the team was a good stock slow bowler, to take some of the bowling effort from the openers.

In no other department was lack of practice shown more clearly than in the fielding. With few exceptions players revealed a marked

tendency to wait for the ball to come and not run in to it, and a definite inability to hold the simplest of catches; and nothing can do more to dampen a bowler's enthusiasm than to see easy catches muffed and runs needlessly thrown away.

Two wicket-keepers were tried during the season, Norton and McLaughlin. Norton took most catches of any player in the team, fifteen, while McLaughlin's brilliance in the last rounds gave indication of a very successful season next year.

The captain in the early part of the cricket year was Leventhal, who sustained a broken finger in the match against North Sydney. His position was filled by Smith who handled the side capably with the readily given assistance of Dwyer, his vice-captain.

REPORT ON SECOND XI.

This team commenced the season with bright prospects but very soon replacements in the First XI weakened it to such an extent that it slipped from 4th in the table to second last. Throughout the twenty-four matches over forty players represented in this team. Thus the lack of success may in some measure be attributed to the want of co-ordination among the members.

Of the batsmen Hilliar, Binns, Westphalen and Westaway recorded some fine innings before being promoted to the firsts, while in the bowling department Hudson captured 9 for 22 off 7 overs against Glebe and Dunlop took 3-42, 5-56, 6-25, 4-33 and 5-13 in consecutive appearances a total of 23 wickets at an average of 13. The fielding was far below par and too many catches were dropped to give the bowlers any chance of dismissing the opponents for a reasonable total.

REPORT ON THIRD ELEVEN.

The chief function of the thirds during the past season, as it has been for a long time, was the unearthing of talent for the senior grades. In other words the little success that was achieved was due rather to individual efforts than to good, solid team work. Broome, Pollard, Davidson, Mortiss and R. Allison were most successful with the bat, but the main weakness of the team lay in the bowling. Spahill captained the side capably and scored runs freely when they were sorely needed.

REPORT ON FOURTH ELEVEN.

The most pleasing feature of the matches played by this team during the season was the keenness shown by those members who played week after week. This team spirit was amply revealed by the fighting way in which the second last match was won outright.

Those most responsible for the success obtained were in the batting Dan and Rogers, and in the bowling Coombes and Austin. The latter is to be congratulated on taking 58 wickets during the season at an average of 11.

Congratulations.

Congratulations are extended to the following clubs on their success during the past Season:- Marrickville (winners of 1st. grade), Western Suburbs (winners of 2nd grade), Randwick (winners of 3rd grade) Bexley A (winners of Shire's Competition) and St. George (winners of the Club Championship.)

The Club is especially pleased to record their congratulations to Marrickville who have had their first success in first grade after

twenty-two years participation in the N.S.W. Cricket Association Competition.

The Committee also wishes to congratulate those members who were awarded Blues for the 1943-44 Season. They are:- G. S. Smith, B. Dwyer, F. Ring, F. Farrar and J. Stenmark. Again to Smith on his selection in the N.S.W. Cricket Association team on the two occasions it played the Combined Services.

On Active Service.

Owing to the great difficulty experienced in compiling a list of all the University Cricketers, it has been decided that it would be rather unfair to publish any such record until completed.

Appreciation.

In such a report as this it is befitting that the first appreciation recorded should be to our groundsman Mr. Tom. Ludwig, who, as in previous years, has given the Club his whole hearted support. His wickets, much to the sorrow of our bowlers, were all that could be desired especially as the oval took more punishment during the football season than ever before.

Equally deserving of praise for its loyal support is the Sports Union, and in particular Miss Hodgson who has shown unfailing interest in the Club throughout the season.

Misses Helen Cox and Lindsay Hudson have performed yeomen services in their capacities of scorers for the 1st and 2nd eleven's respectively.

Once again Mr. Eldershaw took a very active part in arranging the annual G.P.S. match which everyone declares was a great success.

The Patron and President for their generosity in settling for the expenses incurred by the G.P.S. match. Also to Vice-Presidents who continued to take an active interest in the Club. We were particularly glad to see Dr. Colin White at many of the matches and trust that our indifferent performances will not keep him away in future. The Committee feels that the presence of such men as Dr. White at matches helps to spur the members on to greater efforts and hopes that more people will follow his splendid example.

Once again Professor Ward has not only shown a great deal of interest in the Club by attending matches but has also looked after our interests on the oval.

This section of the report would not be complete without mention of the N.S.W. Cricket Association, and in particular Mr. Harold Heydon. We fear that our Club must give him many headaches and we appreciate very much the way he overlooks our misdeeds.

Mr. "Scotty" MacDonald.

The Committee was very pleased to learn that "Scotty", as he is known to us all, because of his loyal support has been made an Honorary Life member of the Sydney University Sports Union. For many years he has been a keen follower of the club, and has always given his services to the club when called upon.

Ian Vickery.

During the year the Club was given a large donation by the parents of Ian who was for many years a member and later Captain of the First XI.

This was done in order to carry out one of Ian's last wishes which was that "something might be given to the University Club as they are always in need of something and never have the money to get it". The Committee decided that a cup should be purchased called the "Ian Vickery Memorial Cup" and be played for each year by teams representing University and Combined G.P.S. The schools have not yet been approached about this scheme but we do not anticipate anything disrupting it.

Interfaculty.

The Interfaculty competition was won by Medicine and thus they become the holders of the Holland Shield for the ensuing year.

## REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE

Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your approval the 80th Annual General Report of your Club.

The Club was represented in all three grades of the N.S.W. C.A. District Competition, and one XI in the Shires Competition.

The N.S.W.C.A. reverted to two day games, a change which was greatly welcomed by your Committee, who unanimously agreed it was in the best interests of the game, and more suitable to University cricket than one day games.

The annual match against the Combined G.P.S. XI was a distinct success, and resulted in a win for University. Your Club owes a debt of gratitude to the Principal of St. Andrew's College, Dr. Cumming Thom, for entertaining the teams at lunch.

### FIRST XI

With only three experienced batsmen available, two of whom, Farrar and Hilliar, owing to exams, would have to leave the team at Christmas; and with only two recognised bowlers, the prospects of the first XI appeared somewhat hopeless at the beginning of the season. However, the President, Mr. Stenmark, by his encouragement and advice, and the Captain, G. S. Smith, by his innate ability, were able to effect gradual improvements and by the end of the season several parts of the machine were functioning reasonably well. Although statistically the results were not excellent (only three matches being won), several close finishes made most matches interesting, particularly that against Northern Districts where a dropped catch in the last over meant the difference between victory and defeat. The most pleasing feature of the whole season was the happy relationship between the officials and members of the team with everyone, endeavouring to do their best for the Club. Your selectors are not at all despondent, and believe the experience gained by our young players, and the influx of new blood, will produce formidable sides in the future.

### BATTING:

At first appearance the batting, with only one player, Brian Dwyer, scoring over 400 runs, and two, Ring and Howell, scoring over 300, appears weak, but when other circumstances are taken into consideration, the batting of the team becomes the most promising feature of the future. Dwyer deserves commendation for his efforts. His runs were scored practically always in uphill circumstances and while at the wickets he had to educate the younger members of the team. His efforts were not fruitless as is shown by the fact that at least on one occasion, when the team was in difficulties, every young batsman rose to great heights. In this regard we can mention Coppleson's innings against Randwick, Howell's against Paddington and Cumberland, Newman's against North Sydney, Westaway's against Waverly, Westphalon's against Marrickville, Young's against St. George and Stenmark's against Paddington. As each of these innings progressed, and the player's confidence increased, they showed that their defence was good, that they had scoring shots and that they could adapt their play to the circumstances of the match. All of them will be with University for at least three years. Special mention must be made of Findlay, who commenced the season in the thirds, scored the only century of the Club with the seconds and finished as opening batsman of the firsts.

### BOWLING:

The bowling was possibly the most unbalanced part of the team. The absence of change bowlers of sufficient calibre meant



that an undue strain was placed on the opening attack, Smith and Ring, and although they were assisted by Dwyer, they were worked too hard to do themselves justice and only their unselfishness and team spirit enabled them to carry on. Special mention must be made of Smith's effort against Balmain.

FIELDING:

The improvement in the ground fielding was one of the pleasing features of the season. Too many catches were dropped and attention will have to be given to this aspect of fielding if the team is to be more successful. To stress this one can only point to Norton's excellent catching against Marrickville and the opposite effects of dropped catches against Northern Districts, Waverley and St. George.

PRACTICE:

When taking into consideration (owing to the war), the shortened courses and the consequent late hours of finishing practical classes and clinical lectures the attendance at practice was good, but with practically every old Blue on active service the absence of experienced players was sadly felt and consideration should be given by the Committee to the more organised teaching of the younger members of the team.

GENERAL:

A report on the first XI would be incomplete without:-

- (a) congratulating Waverley on winning the premiership; and
- (b) expressing an appreciation of the advice and help given to the young members by the experienced players of other Clubs. We may be pardoned for mentioning among others - Marks and Chegwyn of Randwick, Morgan of Balmain, Cadden of Cumberland, Longbottom of St. George, Chilvers of Northern Districts, Walmsley of Western Suburbs and Seddon of Petersham; and mention
- (c) of the pleasant and keen games played by our opponents; also
- (d) of the fine sporting spirit of Cumberland in endeavouring to continue the match on the second day; and, last but not least
- (e) of the debt that University cricket owes to the Captain of the team Stewart Smith. Time and time again he sacrificed his own cricket in the interests of the team; the example he set in the field was outstanding; his unselfishness was most marked and his endeavours to mould the younger players into an eleven were always evident.
